

TAX PROGRAM COORDINATION TO BE TALKED

A meeting of the members of the various tax levying bodies of Klamath county has been called for September 5 at 10 a. m., at the county courtroom, by County Judge U. S. Reeder, as the first step toward coordinating taxing programs of this area.

Judge Reeder has sent a letter to the tax bodies explaining the purpose of the meeting and outlining the effort which has started here and has already drawn favorable comment from experts in other parts of the state.

The judge's letter follows: "I think we all realize that the years just ahead of us will be serious ones for all concerned. If we are going to 'win the war' the government is going to need every dollar available and it is going to get what is needed. This means that local governments will not be able to operate on the scale they have been used to. It is the wise thing to face the facts now and make our plans for the future."

"You will agree with me that we are going to face a serious tax problem even sooner than expected. I also feel that you will agree that it is our duty, as tax levying officials, to take the initiative in solving this problem before it is too late."

"I am therefore calling a meeting of all heads of the various branches of local government in Klamath county, to be held at the county court room on September 5, 1942, at 10 o'clock. You are at liberty to invite any key officials of your departments or members of budget committees."

Study Considered
"This will be a preliminary meeting to talk over our various problems and consider the advisability of forming a central organization, representing all tax levying bodies in the county, for the study and dissemination of reliable information as to our tax problems."

"Klamath county has never had a combined analysis of its tax levying bodies which may be used as a basis for a study of taxation problems. This, together with other factors, has caused a lack of general understanding and education concerning taxation problems."

"With the nine or more tax levying bodies working independently, as they do, it is impossible to get a complete picture of the actual needs of all the various branches of local government. We will all have to cooperate and coordinate our efforts if we are going to solve this serious problem now before us. It is our duty to our country and to the taxpayers to contribute our best combined efforts to work out a solution, so we will expect each of you to be present at this meeting."

The program as outlined by the judge was recently mentioned in a report by the taxation committee of the Klamath County chamber of commerce, of which W. O. Smith is chairman.

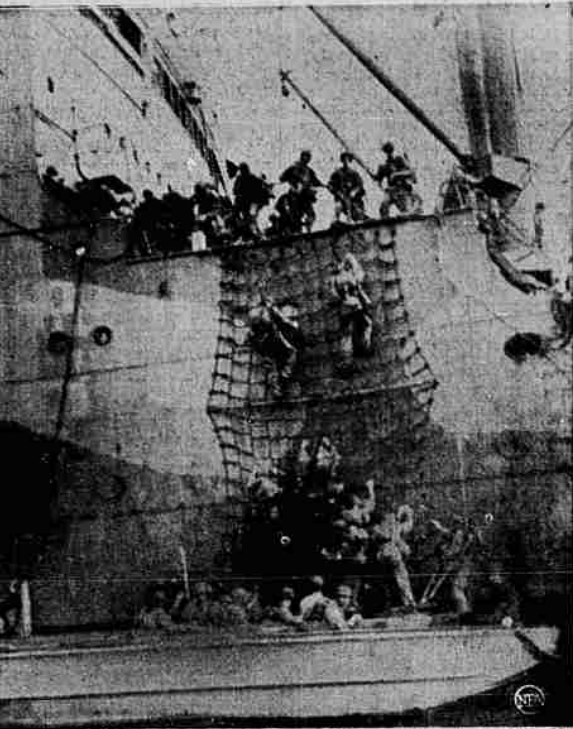

EXTENSION OF CONSERVATION DISTRICT EYED

LANGELL VALLEY — The Langell Valley Soil Conservation district supervisors mailed a petition signed by 13 landowners to the state soil conservation committee for the purpose of enlarging the boundaries of the district.

This petition, including federal, state and private lands, would enlarge the east side of the district by approximately 42,000 acres, according to M. T. Prince, chairman of the board of supervisors of the district.

Hearing To Be Held
In order to present a petition to the state soil conservation committee, it was necessary for at least two-thirds of the landowners, owning at least 60 per cent of the land in the proposed addition, to sign the petition. The committee will set a date to be announced later for hearing which will be open to the landowners within the district and the area to be added to the district.

Equipment Available
The public hearing is for the purpose of permitting the committee to determine whether this territory should be added to the present boundaries of the Langell Valley Soil Conservation district.

Prince stated that the landowners signed the petition in order to receive the technical assistance and the use of the equipment which the Langell Valley Soil Conservation district can make available to farmers. The technical assistance, which includes soil surveys, engineering and conservation planning, has been made available to the district by the Soil Conservation service of the United States department of agriculture. The Soil Conservation service is also loaning the district several pieces of equipment to assist in the conservation work of the district.

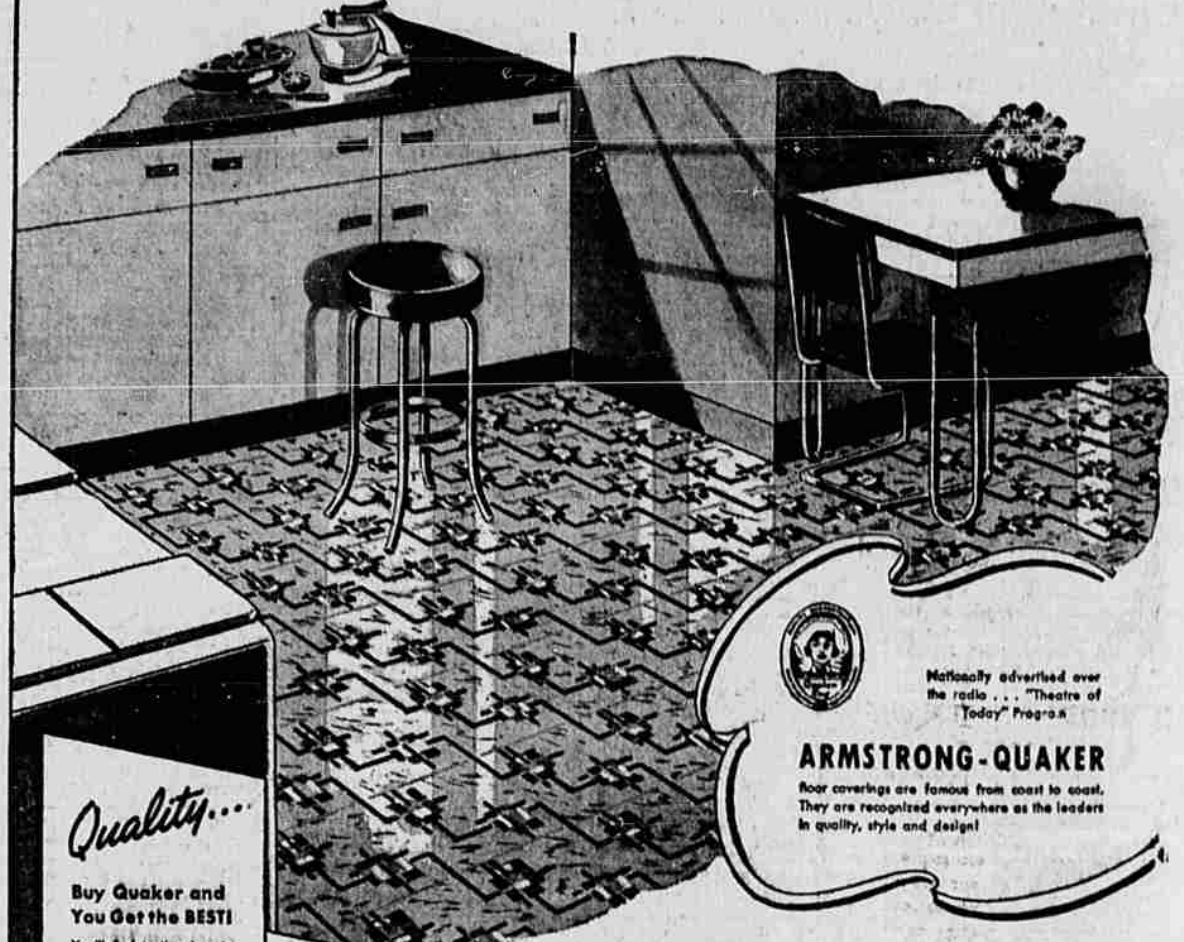
