

COUNTY HEALTH UNIT REPORTS CASE SERVICE

The Klamath county health unit staff rendered a total of 15,049 services in the first six months of the present year, according to a report submitted at a meeting of the county health board.

These services were detailed as follows:

It was also made known that more and more work due to selective service is falling in the hands of the health unit and its staff.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1 (AP) A nation-wide school lunch program sponsored by the agriculture department last year will be continued this year with the purchase of large quantities of apples beginning tomorrow, the department announced.

Purchases this year will be mainly of No. 1 dessert varieties of commercial importance, at an opening price of \$1.25 the packed bushel.

More than 6,000,000 children in 93,000 schools ate fresh apples in last year's program.

In urging this sacrifice at the opening of the winter relief campaign last night, Hitler said that "in this most tremendous struggle of all times, the German soldier is making his heavy sacrifice in battle under scarcely imaginable deprivations."
