

TREASURY READY WITH LUXURY SPENDING TAX

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1 (AP) Treasury representatives were ready today to lay before the senate finance committee a revolutionary proposal for taxing the money that taxpayers spend.

Designed to combat inflation by inducing people to save their money instead of using it to bid up prices, the treasury plan was understood to call for a graduated tax on that portion of personal expenditures not covered by income tax exemptions, credits for dependents, debts, insurance, premiums, government bonds purchases, and other savings.

One critical member of the committee, Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.), remarked to reporters: "It's the sales tax rose under another name, but it doesn't smell as sweet."

\$5 Billion Yield
In presenting a somewhat similar plan to the house ways and means committee in closed session, Randolph Paul, treasury general counsel, said it called for "pushing the regular income tax as high as it could go without imposing excessive hardship on debtors, and then using the savings tax to get the rest of the income-tax money that was needed."

Chairman George (D-Ga.) said the treasury estimated the proposed levy would yield between four and five billion dollars a year.

DEFENSE HURRIED FOR CALIFORNIA

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1 (AP) Governor Culbert L. Olson declared today after talking with Director James M. Landis of the office of civilian defense that the OCD was fully aware of California's need for civilian defenses and was expediting equipment within manufacturing limitations.

The executive told a press conference "We are not criticizing OCD for unavoidable delays in manufacturing but we do emphasize California is entitled to priorities in deliveries because of its position." Olson said Landis had promised to visit the state late this month to confer with state and local defense officials.

He said he would propose to social security board officials this afternoon that an agreement be reached on interpretation of the federal old age assistance laws to enable pension recipients to increase their incomes without having money deducted from their pensions.

A conference also was planned with War Production Board Chief Donald Nelson, Olson said, to discuss development and production of strategic minerals in California — particularly northern California and extending into Oregon.

Explosion Kills Three in Eastern War Factory

METUCHEN, N. J., Sept. 1 (AP)—An explosion and fire destroyed a small building of the New Jersey Fulgent company today, killing at least three persons and injuring an undetermined number.

The plant, working on war contracts, is in Raritan township, near Metuchen.

Three slight blasts were heard at 9:50 a. m. and were followed by a terrific explosion that shook the vicinity. Fire broke out in the corrugated metal building, one of many structures on the plant property, but was brought under control within a short time.

SOLDIER'S EXAMPLE

DES MOINES, Ia. (AP)—Private Albert S. Bushta of Fredricktown, Pa., stationed at the Fort Des Moines army post, bid \$1500 for a good used tire offered at an auction in a war bond selling program.

"I don't want a tire," he explained, "but I wanted to show you people how to bid."

Buying the bonds, he turned back the tire, which sold twice more for \$1500 and for \$1000.

PENNEY COMPANY HITS BOND RECORD

The J. C. Penney company's 1609 stores, whose 4 per cent July quota for war stamp and bond sales was \$1,200,000, turned in a total of \$8,422,553.85, or almost 25 per cent of its merchandise sales—which is the equivalent of one destroyer plus one submarine plus 100 army fighter planes plus 36 light tanks.

The importance of this achievement was acknowledged in a wire from Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau, who particularly noted the tremendous scope of the company-wide publicity program which made this result possible.

While the company average amounted to about 25 per cent of its total July sales, individual stores and states turned in greater percentages. In Tennessee, for example, the company's 21 stores made 68 per cent of their entire sales in war stamps and bonds. In a small store in upper New York, the percentage was over 984 per cent of volume—a sale of almost 10 times as many war bonds as merchandise, it was pointed out.

Mexican Labor Assured California

SACRAMENTO, Sept. 1 (AP) Definite assurance of Mexican farm labor for California came Monday from Secretary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickard.

Final arrangements are being completed for the importation of Mexican workers to help harvest the state's crop in sections where domestic labor cannot be obtained, Wickard said in a telegram to Governor Culbert L. Olson.

PORTLAND, Sept. 1 (AP)—Two subchasers and one minesweeper will go down the ways and the keels of four other navy craft will be launched in Oregon shipyards Labor day as the navy holds a nationwide mass launching and keel-laying ceremony.

Portland's Commercial Iron Works will furnish most of the state's participation, launching two subchasers and laying the keels for two subchasers and two fleet tugs. The Kruse-Banks shipyard at Coos Bay will launch the minesweeper.

To The Patrons of the Motion Picture Theatres

The President of the United States has publicly expressed his desire that the motion picture theatres of the country do their utmost to maintain their service to the public, not only because of the assistance which they render in supporting the welfare and morale of the American people but likewise because of their usefulness, through news reels and otherwise, in vividly disseminating information throughout all quarters of the Nation.

The Klamath Falls theatres are doing, and will continue to do, everything possible to carry out the President's wishes, but increasing difficulties in obtaining supplies, particularly motion picture film, the basic ingredients of which are required in the manufacture of high explosives, together with losses in our trained employees, many of whom are in the armed forces or are engaged in other war activities, have made it necessary to place in effect a unification of all of the motion picture theatres in Klamath Falls under a single management the purposes and policies of which are the continued efficient operation of the theatres, to the end that the people of this locality may at all times have presented for their patronage the best available in motion pictures and the entertainment, information and relaxation that they afford.

Economic, Financial Study Of Western Pine Started

The National War Labor Board has initiated a factual study of the economic and financial performance of the Western Pine Industry. It was announced in Portland by A. L. Morgan of the staff of the United States tariff commission, who is directing the study.

The study, which is being made under coordinated responsibilities of the tariff commission staff and the bureau of labor statistics of the department of labor and with the assistance of numerous other agencies of the government, is designed to provide authentic material which will "enlighten wage discussions in the western pine industry," he said.

The present study will follow lines similar to those followed in studies of the Douglas fir industry made last spring and fall by Morgan for a commission of which Dr. Dexter M. Keezer,

president of Reed college, was chairman.

In addition to a group of members of the technical and accounting divisions of the tariff commission which will carry out an investigation of the operational and financial aspects of the industry, the bureau of labor statistics will collaborate in making those phases of the study which will have to do particularly with wages and employment in the industry, Morgan said.

Morgan said he anticipated that the field work for the study would be completed in about two months and that the report will be available for distribution late in the fall.
