NEVADA, UTAH GO TO POLLS TODAY

RENO, Nev., Sept. 1 (AP)—Nevada and neighbor Utah held primary elections today, with but few colorful issues to stir a war-busy electorate.

Democrats had no competition whatsoever on the Nevada slate. Of principal interest was the U. S. senatorial race between Berkeley L. Bunker, the young incumbent who was appointed to succeed the late Sen. Key Pittman, and former Governor James G. Scrugham, a Nevada congressman the past ten years.

Three candidates sought Nevada's lone seat in congress—State Senator Archie C. Grant, Lieut. Governor Maurice Sullivan and Mrs. Harriett Spann, former state WPA official.

E. P. Carville, the incumbent, was opposed by Roland H. Wiley, Clark county district attorney, in the gubernatorial race.

In Utah, only two congressional seats were at stake aside from minor posts, and a scant 25 per cent vote was forecast. Rep. Walter K. Granger of Cedar City was unopposed for the first district democratic nomination.
