

COUNCIL TALKS CHARTER, PARK BOARD SHIFT

Resolutions to submit to the voters at the November elections the new city charter, and the question of transfer of park board functions to the city council were adopted at an adjourned meeting of the council on Tuesday night.

Ordinances calling for the election were passed to their second reading at the meeting. Final reading will take place next Monday night.

A letter from Don Drury, chairman of the local war price and rationing board was read, requesting that the city assume equal responsibility with the county for the expense of maintaining the OPA office at 434 Main street. He said that \$25 each from the city and county would probably be adequate to cover incidental expenses. July bills have already been taken care of by the county, but August bills are yet to be paid, he said.

The council voted to refer the matter to the finance committee with instructions to discuss it with the county court.

At a regular adjourned meeting of the council Monday night, held in lieu of the regular session cancelled because it was the fifth Monday in the month, the resignation of City Health Officer George D. Massey who has been called into the service was accepted. Mayor John Houston appointed Dr. Peter Rozental to fill the office, the appointment being confirmed by the council.

MOSCOW, Sept. 2 (AP)—The Russian radio announced tonight that a heavy force of soviet bombers set 24 big fires in Warsaw last night in an air assault directed against German military and industrial targets in the Nazi-occupied capital of Poland.

Again, as in earlier Russian air attacks reaching from East Prussia to Berlin itself, the announcement said all the soviet planes returned.

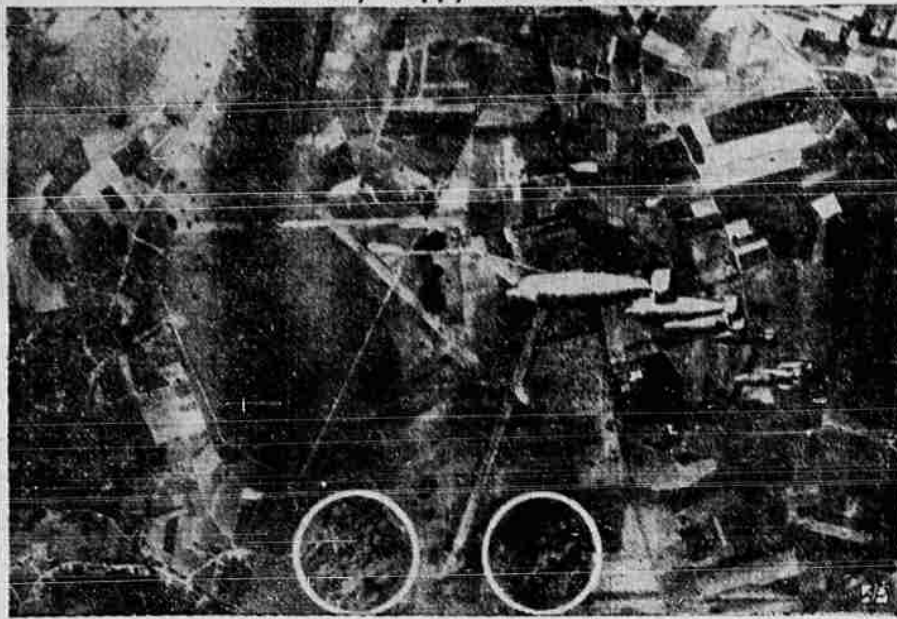
Besides the major fires, the raiders were said to have touched off explosions and 30 lesser fires, including some at two Warsaw railroad stations.

Ackerman Will Not Enter Race for Police Judge Post

Leigh Ackerman, who has held the office of police judge since June 17, 1940 when he took over Carl Cook's unexpired term, today issued a statement he is not a candidate for re-election.

"I wish to take this opportunity to announce that I will not be a candidate for the office of police judge in the coming municipal election.

"May I thank the many citizens who supported me in the last election and also express my appreciation to the people of Klamath Falls for the excellent spirit of cooperation that has been shown me during my term in office. This, with the cooperation of the other city officials and employees, has made my tenure of office very agreeable.

"It is with a great deal of gratification that I can report that the financial affairs and other affairs of the office of police judge are in excellent condition according to reports of the auditors.

"I expect to return to the local police department where I feel that possibly I can serve the citizens of this community more effectively."

Ackerman was "drafted" to run for the office in 1941, petitions being circulated by his friends while he was away on his vacation. He won the election by a margin of 4-1 over his opponent, Herbert Munsell, at that time.

Upon assuming his duties as police judge, Ackerman was granted a leave of absence from his duties with the police department with which he has served since 1931. His present leave of absence expires on January 8, 1943, enabling him to return to the department with his former rank of sergeant. He has been in police work for 33 years, for 30 of which he has been a qualified fingerprint expert with most of his time devoted by technical work.

For the past four years, Ackerman has been on the teaching staff of the police school conducted annually at Eugene by the FBI. Last year he completed a term as president of the Oregon Association of City Police Officers of which he is now a member of the executive board.

SOVIETS FIGHT HARD FOR CITY; NO LET-UP SEEN

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er-attacking in the Mordok and Prokhladnaya areas.

In the first detailed account of the massive struggle southwest of Stalingrad, Red Star told today how Von Bock finally cracked red army defenses after throwing two fresh divisions and hundreds of planes and tanks into the struggle.

Tank Attack Launched

For several days, the army newspaper said, Marshal Timoshenko's men held off the savage Nazi assaults northeast of Kotelnikovsky. In five days of fighting it reported the Germans lost thousands of men, 100 tanks and 34 planes.

Paced by 80 tanks, the Germans then launched a two-column assault, Red Star related, with infantry-laden trucks rolling up behind the tanks in simultaneous dawn attacks.

A hundred Nazi planes filled the sky, pouncing upon Russian positions.

Blasted Out

By the middle of the day Red Star said the red army had met and turned back both German columns.

Von Bock brought up more troops, tanks and planes. Then in mid-afternoon the second violent attack was loosed.

In the ensuing wild melee that lasted until sunset soviet defenders were blasted from their positions by the overwhelming weight of Nazi fire and steel, forcing withdrawal to new positions.

IT is announced today that U. S. forces have arrived in the Belgian Congo (in Africa). The Belgian Congo is on the line of the U. S. air transport route across Africa to Egypt and the Near East. There will soon be few hot spots where Americans aren't.

THE British bomb Saarbrücken (in southern Germany) for the second time in a week. A returning Canadian pilot says: "If there's a building there that isn't burning, I'll be surprised. Everything seemed to go up in the air."

Remember that these raids on German war production centers affect the Russian fighting comparatively little NOW. German munitions for the war in Russia are already made and delivered. Their effects will be really felt NEXT SPRING.

IRISH radicals are acting up again, and American soldiers have been ordered to stay out of Belfast to avoid a ruckus.

It seems to this writer that the Irish and the Indian radicals are the world's prize saps. With their countries too weak for independence that can stand on its own feet, they must choose between British and German or Jap rule.

Only a sap could choose to be ruled by the Germans or the Japs instead of the English.

100,000 JAPANESE TROOPS MOVE NORTH

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real intentions, a Domei broadcast quoted Premier Hideki Tojo as declaring that his assumption of the foreign ministry "will not result in any way in an alteration of Japan's foreign policy."

Shigenori Togo, who negotiated the Moscow-Tokyo neutrality pact and was regarded as opposed to Japanese hostilities against Russia, resigned the foreign ministry yesterday.

Togo's resignation, coupled with the aggressive Tojo's decision to take over the foreign portfolio, had been widely interpreted outside Japan as pre-signing a possible Japanese attack on Siberia.

In Chungking, China's wartime capital, the influential newspaper Ta Kung showed "Japan has no more need to maintain diplomatic relations with the USSR."

5 Divisions Withdrawn
Other Chinese comment declared the shakeup "portends some bold move by the Japanese war party."

Advices reaching Chungking said five divisions totalling 100,000 Japanese troops had been sent north after being withdrawn from the China war theatre.

Salaries—Mostly white collar workers paid by the week, month or year, up to \$10,000 a year. If included at all, some allowances probably will be made for pay raises accompanying bona fide promotions.

Big incomes — Salaries and other forms of compensation in excess of \$10,000 a year. Some suggestions have been made of discouraging such large incomes by forbidding employers from taking income tax deductions as part of their operating expenses, for more than \$10,000 for any one employee.

On farm prices, the president was reported to be choosing between three alternatives.

1. Let farm prices find their own levels, but use government subsidies to hold down the retail price of food.

2. Fix price ceilings on farm products, as now permitted by law at 110 per cent of parity, and use subsidies if necessary to hold down the cost of food.

3. Use war powers to nullify the 110 per cent parity provision and fix ceilings at whatever level that will keep down the cost of food without subsidies.

YANK FLIERS BLAST GERMAN SUPPLY BASES

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Monday night and in "a successful raid" captured a batch of German prisoners.

8-Mile Advance
The Italian high command asserted that 51 allied planes had been shot down in two days of aerial fighting and that four others crashed after hits by Italian anti-aircraft fire.

Front-line dispatches said Rommel's armored spearheads had split into two columns after advancing eight miles through British minefields at the southern end of the 35-mile corridor between El Alamein, on the Mediterranean coast, and the desolate Cattara depression.

Holding Back
Latest advices said General Alexander was holding back his main tank force, presumably to guard positional advantages, while armored vanguards of the 600-tank axis army warily probed for a "soft spot" which might open a road to the Nile.

Medium bombers of the U. S. 12th bombardment group and heavy bombers of the 98th bomber group attacked axis rear positions and vital supply lines, and planes of the 57th fighter group were in the thick of the fight over the battlefield, slashing at Nazi Stukas.

Not a single allied pilot was lost, it was announced.

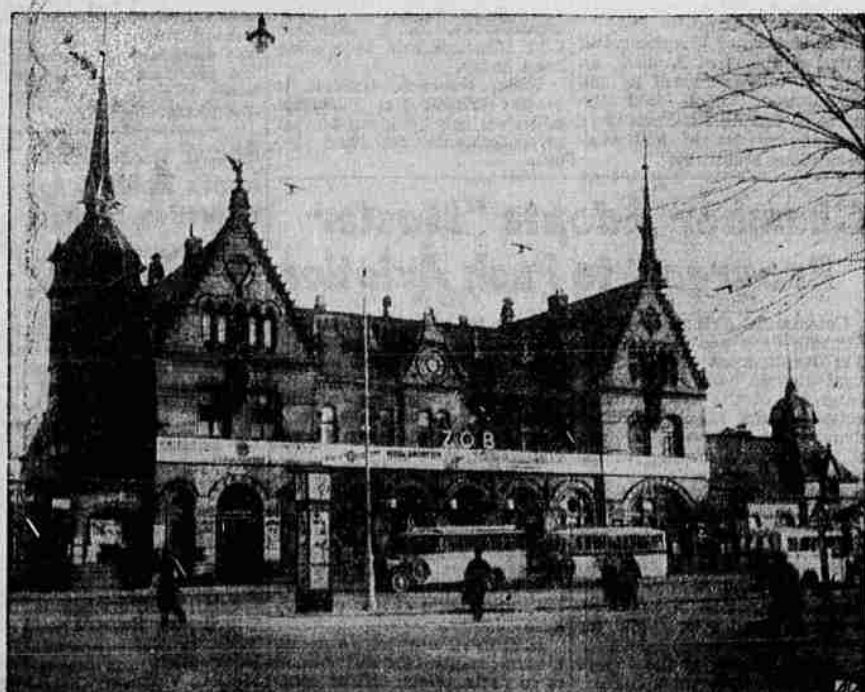
