

BUILDING FOR AUGUST OVER JULY VALUE

Building permits for August, totaling 33 for \$10,499, were less in number but more in value represented than for July when 36 permits for \$9340 were recorded, according to figures compiled by Harold Franey, building inspector.

This compares with only \$2941 in permits issued in June of this year, the low month to date, and \$71,330 for August, 1941, before war priorities began to curb building activities.

Thing of Past
Classified according to type of permits issued in August this year, Franey gave the following figures: remodeling of residences, 21 for \$3899; remodeling business buildings, 4 for \$4450; garages, 6 for \$1350 and re-roofing schools, 2 for \$800.

Building permits as such seem to have become a thing of the past, with "remodeling permits" taking their place, records indicated. Those issued from August 19 to 31 showed only one permit issued for new construction and that was for a garage to cost \$250 to P. L. Johnson at 1438 Sargent street.

Remodeling Permits
Leo N. Huls, contractor, was issued three permits during that period for a total of \$2650. They were for remodeling the old Klamath Furniture building on Main street, \$650; 123-25 North Eighth street for \$1800 and a building on the southwest corner of Ninth and Pine streets for \$200.

THE first lord of the British admiralty (corresponding more or less to our secretary of the navy) adds his word of cheer today. He says:

"If the U-boats found their attack on our forces dangerous last year, I think they'll find it DOUBLY dangerous now."

He adds: "New methods have been developed and NEW DEVICES are in action."

THESE statements are intended to reassure us and make the enemy nervous.

Still, the fact remains that the strength and hitting power of our side are rising and will rise much farther yet while Hitler at least is probably at or even perhaps PAST the peak of his hitting power.

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terception was noted, it added significantly. Again the enemy failed to intercept when fast United States medium bombers—the B-26 type known as Marauders—attacked the Japanese airdrome at Lae, New Guinea.

On the China war front, Japan's invasion armies abandoned another key point in their apparently voluntary retreat from hard-won territory as Chinese dispatches reported the recapture of the important highway and river center of Lupao, 25 miles northwest of Canton.

High Chinese officials have repeatedly insisted that it was merely a question of time before Japan attacked Siberia and that tens of thousands of Japanese troops withdrawn from the China campaign were massing along the Siberian frontier in Manchukuo.

Meanwhile, the Chinese high command reported that heavy fighting was in progress on the outskirts of Kihwa, one of the last Japanese-held air bases on Chekiang province, and that the enemy had brought up reinforcements to defend the city.

In the southwest Pacific theater, Australian troops rested while allied planes bombed and machine gunned enemy forces in the Kokoda sector of New Guinea, 60 miles west of the United Nations outpost at Port Moresby.

Only candidate for the office of police judge so far is Harold Franey, present building inspector, since Leigh Ackerman has definitely decided not to run again.

Three of the five councilman positions are to be filled, the

BONANZA BUS BRIEF TO BE CONSIDERED

Testimony taken at a Public Utilities commission hearing on the proposed abandonment of "on-call" Bonanza-Dairy bus service today was en route to Salem for consideration and a decision.

At the hearing, held yesterday in the circuit courtroom of the county courthouse, it was brought out by Gordon Quimby, operator of the service, that he had traveled over 4000 miles in the past for a net return of \$18.25. The hearing was held on his petition and conducted by Charles Erskine, PUC attorney from Salem.

There was no opposition to Quimby's application for abandonment. Quimby rendered the "on-call" service in conjunction with his regular Klamath Falls-Lakeview route.

Caucasus Battle

In the Caucasus, bitter fighting raged for the Soviet Black Sea naval base at Novorossisk and on the far approaches to the Grozny oil fields more than half way down the Caucasian land bridge to the middle east.

In the Mordok region, 50 miles northwest of Grozny, Russian troops battling to defend river crossings were credited with sinking eight pontoons and three speedboats loaded with nazis.

Agreement Signed

Such reciprocal aid already has been furnished to the United States also by the other signatories without conclusion of formal agreements and, a state department commentary points out, "this aid is rapidly increasing in importance as the intensity of the American war effort increases in the various theaters of operations."

The British, Australian and New Zealand agreements were concluded in Washington by exchanges of notes between Secretary of State Hull, British Ambassador Lord Halifax, Australian Minister Sir Owen Dixon and New Zealand's Minister Walter Nash. The agreement with fighting France was concluded in London by Brig. Gen. John E. Dahlquist, acting military representative of the United States, and Maurice de Jean, representing the French national committee headed by Gen. Charles de Gaulle.

All of the agreements emphasize that the general principle governing mutual aid is that the war production and war resources of each of the signatories should be used in ways most effectively utilizing the available materials, manpower, production facilities and shipping space.

They further specify the elimination, as far as possible, of monetary transactions.

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he was proposing a tax on consumer spending "which will reach into the lowest income groups above the level of bare subsistence and will provide high penalty rates for luxury spending."

In addition, he urged a further lowering of the exemptions for the income tax applying to family income, involving a cut back to \$500 exemption for an individual, \$1000 for married couples and \$250 credit for dependents.

The finance committee recently cut the latter credit from the \$400 level approved by the house to \$300.

Senator Herring, a member of the finance committee, estimated that a 5 to 7 per cent manufacturers' sales tax would produce upwards of \$3,000,000 annually. Further, he forecast that such a levy would prove regular with the citizens because all would pay the tax and as a result feel they had a stake in the government.
