NAZI ARMY STAFF IS OUR REAL FOE

SPOKANE, Sept. 3 (AP)—Asserting "that Hitler isn't our only enemy in Germany," Roy E. B. Bower, former United States consul in Munich, predicted Wednesday the United Nations would discover in the German army's general staff the most formidable foe of democracy.

"The real God of the German people is the army," Bower, who has been lecturing to American army camps for the last year, asserted.

"Americans are playing into their enemies hands when they assume the nazis are tyrannizing a liberty-loving German people. That is entirely untrue. The Germans have no desire and no ability for self-government; they are not adult politically. They have the morals of children."

"The only method of government they consider practical is based on the 'leader' principle."

After commenting that "almost the entire German nation is behind the German general staff and the army," he added that if the general staff foresees defeat, it will attempt to negotiate with the allies after Hitler's removal from the scene."

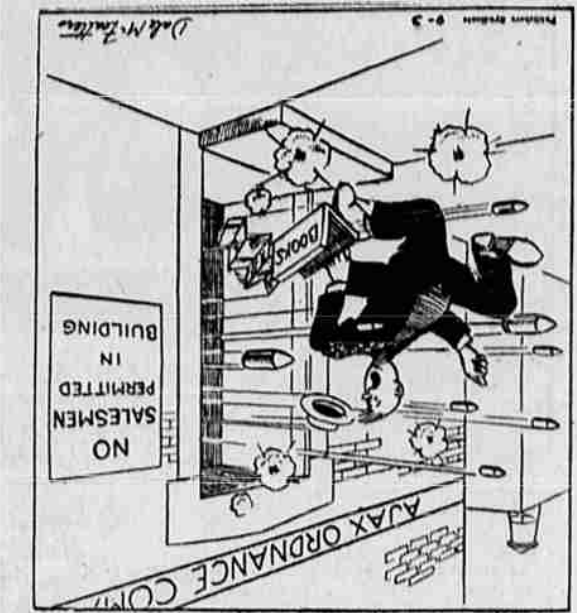
