tanks and planes, maintained "heavy pressure" on the enemy all day yesterday amid "considerable" fighting.

**No Edge Claimed**  
While neither side claimed a decisive edge in the battle, dispatches indicated that Field Marshal Erwin Rommel had failed at least in the initial phase of his new six-day offensive against the El Alamein front, 85 miles west of Alexandria.

The British, however, avoided any suggestion of a full-scale counter offensive and Gen. Sir Harold Alexander's imperial headquarters likewise declared only that British forces "continued their pressure on the enemy's main concentration."

The crew of an American tank "bailed out" after their General Grant had been hit by five shells, then returned and drove it off the field.

**Reds Stiffen**  
Dispatches to Red Star said Marshal Fedor von Bock was now "assembling his last forces" in an effort to break through to the Volga.

"Northwest of Stalingrad, red army men broke into enemy positions and left 270 enemy dead on the battlefield," the Russian communique said.

**Caucasus Front**  
In the Caucasus, the Germans asserted they had captured the town of Tamanskaya on the Taman peninsula, directly east of the Crimean Kerch peninsula, thereby widening the invasion salient on the Caucasian coast.

Reber announced that the company will operate two trucks a day to the Klamath Falls creamery cheese plant at Klamath Falls, taking the milk supply of all customers in the Malin district.

Reber made arrangements with Glenn Kent of the local creamery for maintaining the cheese production, and the cheese salvaged from the fire will be brought here immediately for storage.

**Large Capacity**  
The Klamath plant, Kent said, can take care of the additional requirements by using equipment now idle and running on a longer period each day.

The Malin plant had a capacity of 3000 pounds of cheese a day and used 30,000 pounds of milk daily at the peak.

The Malin factory was built in 1921 and Reber has been affiliated with it from the beginning.

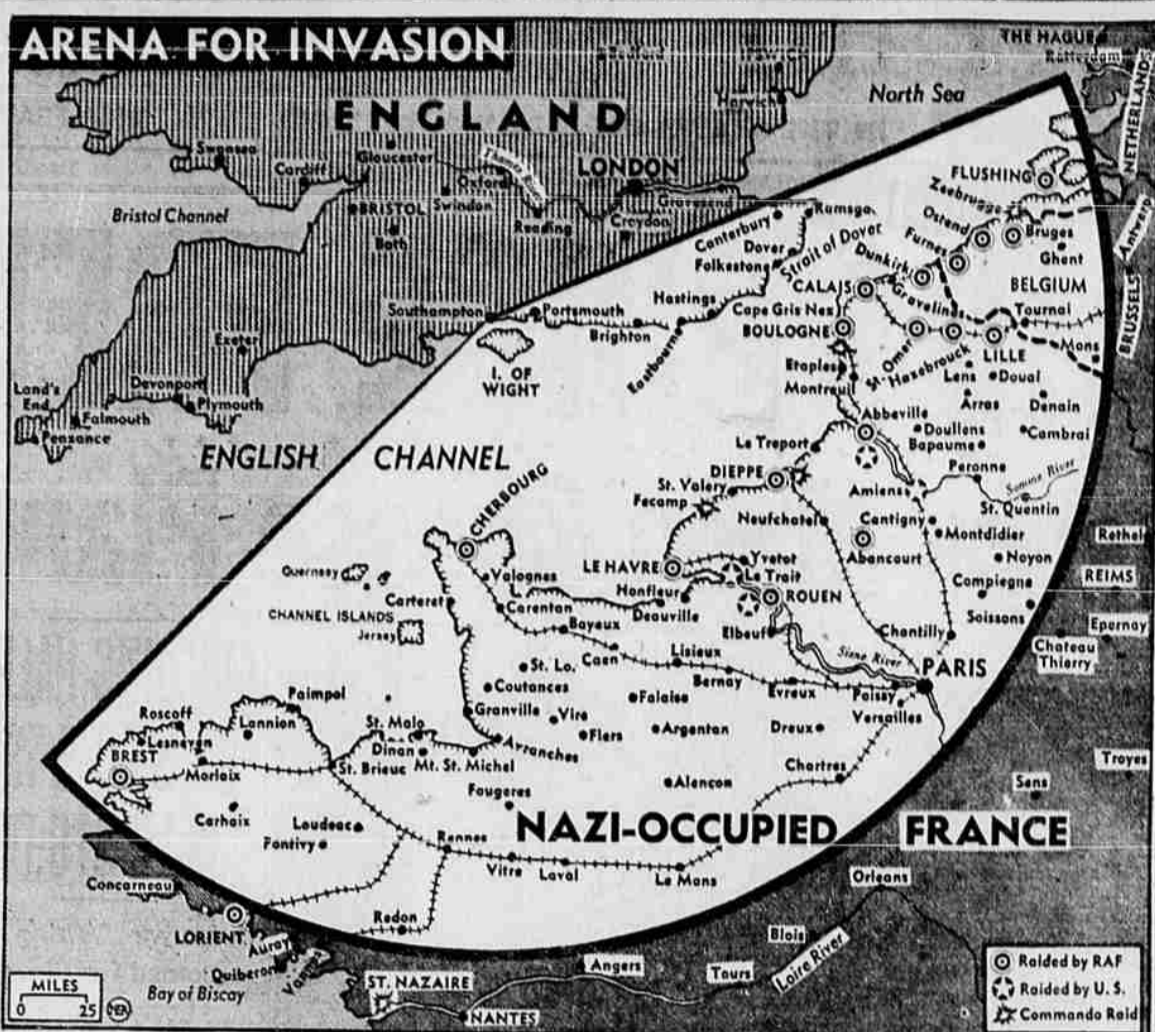

## Japanese Center Should Not Cause Any Shortages Here, Say WRA Officials

through no desire on their part, find an extraordinary condition in their area. What is needed, of course, is a thorough understanding of what the war relocation authority seeks to accomplish at its Tulelake project, and how it handles its problems of supply. On the other hand, there is a need on the part of the WRA of an understanding of the feelings and economic problems of the people in the area surrounding the sprawling evacuee settlement on Tulelake. These needs inspired the inquiries that developed the information for this article.

**Army Rations**  
Let us go on with Mr. Fryer's statement in answer to our inquiries:

"Perishables (for the Japanese project) are purchased under the same arrangements as staples although they do, of course, usually come from other markets.

"It may interest you to know that evacuees at all relocation centers are fed on army ration which is modified to meet the special needs of old people and very young people and also to provide for those of Japanese ancestry whose diet has included rice and fish to a larger degree than that of the average American. The cost of subsistence, as best we can compute it at this time, averages about 38 cents per person per day."

**Basin Shouldn't Suffer**  
Regional Director Fryer's statements show that in theory and plan, at least, there is no intention of making the Klamath basin suffer in its supply of essential foods because the Japanese center has been placed here.

Theory and practice, of course, are two different things. It is conceivable, for instance, that regardless of the general policy of supplying the Japanese center, in certain emergencies purchases of perishables might be placed in such a way as to affect local supply. These, presumably, would be strictly exceptions, but reports of their occurrence may easily stir agitation and public misunderstanding. Needless to say, good judgment dictates their avoidance if at all possible.

**No Project Preference**  
Another point that needs to be better understood by the public is that there is a difference between supplying the commissaries at the Japanese center (there are 65 mess halls there) and the stores there. Regional Director Fryer directs attention to this in the following paragraph of his statement to this newspaper:

"... You also mention the soft drink shortage around Klamath Falls. In this case, the WRA is not making any purchases although considerable quantities, I do know, are being bought at the store at the Tulelake project. This store is operated by the evacuees under the general supervision of the WRA. I am sure of one thing—that any shortage which may have developed in the soft drink supply around Klamath Falls was not due to any suggestion by the WRA that the project have preference. I am told, incidentally, that there is often a shortage on the project."

**Rationing Did It**  
Many local people have been convinced that soft drink shortages here in the past hot season

were in some way blameable upon the Japanese center, although those who supply soft drinks both here and there declare this is not the case. It is a simple matter, they say, of sugar rationing. Sugar for soft drink manufacture here was based on 70 per cent of last year until a recent extra allotment was granted. Sugar used for making soft drinks for the Japanese center, they say, does not come out of the Klamath ration.

Also, the supply of one popular brand of soft drink here was shut off for several days when machinery broke down.

It is reported there have been soft drink shortages at Medford, and in other areas remote from the Japanese center.

Sugar rationing, too, lay back of the now famous popsicle shortage.

**The Popsicle Question**  
For three weeks last summer, Klamath kids couldn't purchase popsicles. One firm wanted to buy a lot of them to give to youngsters here, but couldn't get them.

At the same time, popsicles were available at the Japanese center stores.

What happened, according to the local makers of popsicles, was this: Sugar rationing made it impossible to make popsicles for those three weeks for local consumption. The sugar supply simply ran out. But a ration of sugar was available for the Japanese center popsicles.

**Share Shortage**  
The proximity of the Japanese center had no effect on the local ration. We would have been without popsicles, regardless. But the Japanese stores did get popsicles when they were not available here.

Popsicles seem like an insignificant item, but this incident forms the basis of another point of a suggested fair policy: certainly the Japanese center, store or mess halls, should sustain at least the same restrictions and shortages that are forced upon the Caucasian community.

**Old Customers First**  
Wholesalers who deal with the Japanese center stores and agents claim stoutly that in all cases they serve their old and regular customers first. One manager, for instance, asserted he would not accept orders from the Japanese center for bananas as long as there is a shortage in the supply of bananas available for the general community. Wholesalers who stick to such a policy will be playing fair with the loyal American citizens here.

Times being what they are, and there being a highly peculiar condition in this basin so long as our nation is at war with Japan and there is a Japanese center here, there are bound to be incidents that ruffle the surface of local feeling.

**No Real Suffering**  
We are entering a period of inevitable scarcity in certain items we are accustomed to having. These scarcities may occur in communities throughout the country, but in the Klamath basin there will be those who suspect the Japanese center as the cause of it all, and the rumors will fly.

In general, it seems fair to state that thus far there has been no real suffering here because of the Tulelake project, and further that the project supply pol-

icy, if adhered to, should work out fairly for this community.

**Impressive Evidence**  
There have been minor incidents that have aroused resentment and suspicion. These have served a purpose in emphasizing a fair general policy, and perhaps out of it will come a better public understanding of the WRA policies and problems at the Tulelake settlement.

Mentioned heretofore is the necessity of providing an example, in the war relocation projects, for fair treatment of our people who are held by Japanese, and for denying their captors an excuse for acts of oppression. Can there be any more impressive evidence of the sympathetic treatment of the Japanese here than the insistence of the surrounding Caucasian community that it not be curtailed in either essentials or luxuries for the benefit of the evacuees?

(Editor's Note: This is the first of a series of articles dealing with the war's effect on the supply of foods, goods and services to this community. In forthcoming articles, there will be further mention of the Japanese center supply in relation to dairy products, fuel, etc.)
