The American nation at war gave up most of its traditional Labor Day week-end frolicking today in order to keep the production machine grinding against the axis.

War workers throughout the land stuck to their machines with little if any urging. In Detroit, in fact, CIO spokesmen protested to President Roosevelt against shutdowns they said had been ordered Monday at Chrysler and Ford plants.

A Chrysler corporation spokesman said that "any department which is behind schedule or has had trouble getting into full production will use that day (Monday) to full advantage." A Ford spokesman declined comment.

Millions of Americans planned "stay at home" weekends this year. There was a marked tendency against purely pleasure motoring, what with the tire-gasoline-automobile structures.

Organized labor in many cities cancelled the usual Labor day parades in line with the "stay on the job" theme. But President William Green of the American Federation of Labor will speak at a Labor day rally in Omaha and President Philip Murray of the Congress of Industrial Organizations will speak at New Kensington, Pa.

Symbolizing the idea that war work goes on at top speed on the holiday, the navy said 150 warships, small and large, would be launched or their keels laid in 27 states on Monday.

CADET EXAM BOARD HERE SATURDAY

According to an announcement by Lt. Col. B. H. Hensley, district army recruiting officer for the state of Oregon, the aviation cadet examining board will be in Klamath Falls on Saturday, September 12, for the purpose of conducting mental and physical examinations for applicants who desire appointment as aviation cadets in the U. S. army air force.

All applicants for this appointment are advised that all papers must be submitted to the local army recruiting office not later than 5 p. m. Wednesday, September 9. Young men between the ages of 18 and 26, inclusive, are eligible for appointment and must present a birth certificate, three letters of recommendation and if under 21 years of age, their parent's consent. No formal education is required, but all applicants must pass the prescribed mental tests and must be normally healthy.

Officer Status

Successful applicants will be enlisted in the air force reserve and will return to their homes to await the call for active duty, which will be in approximately 60 days from date of examination. They will then be sent to one of the many flying schools conducted by the air forces and after they have completed their training will be commissioned as second lieutenants in the army air forces with the status of flying officer.

Applications and parent consent forms may be obtained at the local army recruiting office, 219 postoffice building. Full information and literature may also be obtained without obligation.

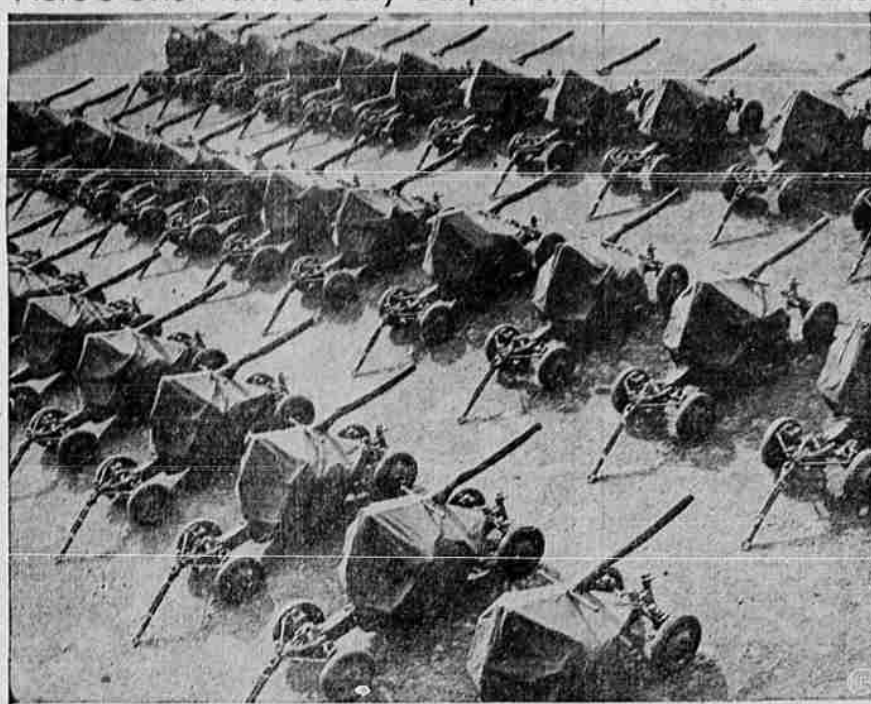

Only thus can it be made to work. ON Monday, we shall pass through a door ON THE OTHER SIDE OF WHICH LIES DICTATORSHIP. Even as rugged an individualist as Herbert Hoover told us a few days ago that for the duration of the war we shall have to have some form of dictatorship IN ORDER TO WIN.

We're ready to do what we have to do to win. But let's resolve, and sign the resolution in blood, to LEAVE THE DOOR OPEN BEHIND US, so that after the war is won we may RETURN to the American way of life instead of GOING ON to the European way of dictatorship.

CRATER TRAVEL TAKES NOSEDIVE

The number of visitors to Crater Lake National park during the month of August this year was 22,147 as compared to 80,297 last year, a decrease of 58,150 or 72.1 per cent. Travel to the park for the travel year beginning October 1, 1941, to date, is 87,592 compared to 238,781 last year, a decrease of 151,189 or 63.3 per cent.

During the month of August, a total of 440 vehicles entered the park carrying military personnel numbering 1887 persons. Forty-seven vehicles and 411 officers and men remained in the park one or more nights, while others made shorter visits. Most of these officers and men were made up from the advance cadre assigned to Camp White near Medford.
