

Few Changes Made In Show Schedule

Exhibitors to Have Free Rein in Show Arrangements Division of Flower Display

Minor changes in the schedule sheet of the annual fall flower show slated for Monday, September the fourteenth, at the Willard hotel, have been announced by Mrs. Roland Oakes, chairman. Most important change is in the show arrangements division and where exhibitors are advised no restrictions have been placed on materials to be used.

In other words, they may use flowers, evergreens, sticks, rocks or other materials.

A division in which quite a bit of interest has been shown is in the luncheon table arrangements, the red, white and blue patriotic exhibits. Right at this particular moment virtually every exhibitor should be inspired to take part in this section, the ideas being practically unlimited.

For the benefit of those wishing to enter the show the general instructions which appeared on the instructor sheets are reprinted at this time:

All entries must be registered by eleven o'clock. No exhibits to be removed before eight o'clock in the evening. All awards will be given at the discretion of the judges. It is desirable that all varieties of specimen blooms be named.

All horticultural entries must be grown by the exhibitor. These will be classified when entered. Three blooms of each variety required for competition, excepting dahlias, phlox, roses, delphinium, hydrangea, gladioli, where one will be judged.

Exhibitors must furnish their own containers and make their own arrangements. Only one entry for competition may be made in any one class.

Exhibitors are asked to please check their entries on a printed schedule to give to the registration committee.

Patriotic arrangements, red, white and blue.

Mixed bouquets, Victorian. Mixed bouquets, modern. Red predominating.

Rose and/or pink predominating.

Blue and/or purple predominating.

White.

Foliage with floral accent. Victory fruits and/or vegetables and/or flowers.

Living room arrangements from 15 to 24 inches in bowls or flat containers.

Living room arrangements from 15 to 24 inches in vases. Show arrangements over 24 inches.
