REGISTRATION SET AT ASHLAND SCHOOL

SOUTHERN OREGON COLLEGE OF EDUCATION, Ashland, Sept. 5 — Registration for the fall term will be held here on Monday, September 21, according to Marshall E. Woodell, registrar.

This year for the first time the college will be able to offer a full two-year secretarial science course for both men and women. The curriculum includes typing, stenography, business English, accounting, business

law, business psychology and office practice and other non-technical subjects.

Young men of military age who are interested in the pre-induction training for enlistment in either the army, navy or the marine corps on a deferred basis should contact college authorities as soon as possible, as enlistment under this program is on a quota basis, it was pointed out.

The Southern Oregon College of Education offers work in both teacher education and junior college. Teacher education students can work for the bachelor of science degree in elementary education and the junior college students can complete from one to two years of work in medi-

cine, law, forestry, engineering, home economics, business administration, and many other fields.

Shell dealers will give a different insignia each week, while they last, free to war stamp purchasers.

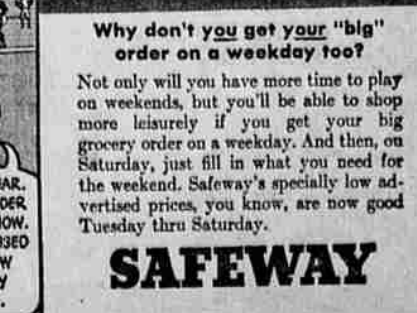
