

OPINION TO BE ASKED ON VENDOR RULE

An opinion of the United States district attorney's office on the legal questions involved in the ordinance which would be asked by City Attorney J. H. Carnahan, he said at Tuesday night's council meeting.

The ordinance was recently adopted after complaints were received by the council concerning the activities of Jehovah's Witnesses, a religious sect. It requires a \$10 license fee from persons selling tracts, pamphlets and similar literature on the streets here. It has not yet gone into effect.

Attorney Carnahan discussed the ordinance at some length at the council meeting, stating he had been informed by a representative of Jehovah's Witnesses that they will carry the legal question to a high court if necessary. Carnahan said that such a fight would cost the city money. Councilmen said other cities might be willing to "chip in" on the test case.

The city attorney said that the United States supreme court has been asked to reconsider a recent decision affecting ordinances similar to that which was adopted here. If reconsideration is given, he said, the legal status of the ordinance may be clarified.

At the Tuesday night meeting, Councilman Rollin Cantrall asked that the city engineer investigate the feasibility of painting cross walks at intersections crossed by children on their way to schools of the city.

He also asked for an investigation of the feasibility of closing a street he described as a "shortcut between West Oregon and Nevada streets."

Councilman Walter Wiesenanger urged strict enforcement of the stop sign ruling at Wall and Esplanade streets. Student cars, he said, are frequently observed violating this sign.

Lakeview, Dorris Roundups Play to Capacity Houses

LAKEVIEW, Sept. 9 (Special)—The annual Lakeview Rotary club livestock auction sale grossed \$6632 and Slim Brehmer of Alturas captured the bronco riding championship to highlight the 23rd annual Lakeview Roundup, this year combined with the annual Lake county fair, which played before capacity houses Saturday, Sunday and Monday, reports here said today.

C. F. Snider, general chairman of the auction, said that a grand champion FFA steer raised by Charles Thomas brought a top bid of 40 cents per pound as did the champion 4-H club steer raised by Barbara Dunham.

A record price of \$5.50 per pound for the grand champion capon raised by Myrna Perry was paid by Marshall Cornett of Klamath Falls. Bill Serruys of Klamath Falls paid \$2 per pound for the grand champion mutton lamb raised by Marshall Ayres.

The grand champion 4-H club fat hog, raised by Robert Nelson, brought 24 cents per pound. Other Klamath Falls men buying stock were E. H. Balsiger and Carl Steinseifer.

Riding the twisting, twirling bronco, Gray Eagle, to the gun, Brehmer, an experienced rodeo performer from across the state line, easily topped first money in the bronco riding and also took first day money in the bucking event Sunday.

Eugene Miller was second and Holly Schroeder third.

Joe Silvera placed first in the Lake county calf roping contest and Friedman Kirk was first in steer stopping. Carol Brunton won the open calf roping title. Brunton and Bill Pentecost captured the team roping event. Ernie Messner was first in bareback riding.

DORRIS—Hundreds of rodeo fans witnessed the first annual Labor Day rodeo here over the weekend, and sponsors of the two-day show said the successful

event would become a standard celebration in future years.

A colorful parade Sunday morning featured a drill by the Siskiyou county sheriff's posse, appearance of Rodeo Queen Monette Calmes of Keno, and many of the world's best cowboys and trick riders.

Over 1500 persons packed the Dorris baseball park Sunday for the opening show. Following the grand entry, introduction of the cowboys and officials and the queen and princesses, the Siskiyou county sheriff's posse presented a well rehearsed drill, the horsemen forming an American flag and a large V to an applauding audience.

Ten rodeo events including bareback horse riding, bucking horse contests and calf roping were climaxed by riding of Mac Barbour's famous herd of wild Brahmas bulls. In the latter event Sunday a clown was injured slightly when a charging bull tossed him over the fence. He was treated at Lumberman's hospital but was reported not seriously hurt. Another rider suffered a torn hand in trying to cling to a wire fence while a bull sought to trample him.

Although most of the "law" of Siskiyou county was present over the weekend, apparently no holds were barred. Local bars and restaurants ran wide open during Saturday and Sunday nights and the holiday spirit afforded a change, at least, for the lumber mill workers and farmers of the Klamath Empire.

Officers said that for the most part the crowds were orderly enough. Only a few drunks were thrown into jail, and the city recreation program sponsored dances at the city hall Saturday and Sunday nights to afford entertainment for the youth of the city.

Much of the success of the rodeo was attributed to the planning of Mac Barbour, who has conducted many similar shows in this area. Announcer Lynn Roycroft said he had seen no better riding performances than those in the Dorris shows.

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enemy from a fortified district west of Moscow and occupied three more settlements, it said. They were reported to have slain 400 Germans and captured prisoners and war supplies.

Planes Support Drive

Red army mortar batteries and rifle units were reported to have slain 350 invaders in two of a series of actions southwest of the Volga river industrial center, where field dispatches said Italian and Rumanian troops and fresh tanks from other fronts had been moved into action.

Four successive assaults supported by massed planes were repulsed in that sector, Izvestia said. The government newspaper said the aircraft "were literally hanging over our front line and bombing our positions," but the Russian forces waited them out and then arose to drive off the enemy land forces.

Caucasus Defense

Red army patrols and mortar batteries wiped out 230 Germans in the overnight fighting about Novorossisk, a Black sea naval base, and 40 German troop trucks were smashed, the Russians said.

Red Star reported that a violent battle raged around the wedge which the Germans and Rumanians have thrust into this sector. The defense position was described as both strained and difficult.

Soviet resistance appeared firmer in the Mozdok district of the central Caucasus, where a battle is under way south of the Terek river. The Russians were reported fighting to annihilate a German formation which crossed the river.

NINE AUTOS RECOVERED, RECORD SHOWS

Nine automobiles were recovered by the city police department during the month of August, three more than the six reported stolen, according to the summary of police activities submitted Tuesday night to the city council by Acting Chief Earl Heuvel. Five out of six bicycles reported stolen during the month were also recovered.

Heuvel reported that the police judge had collected a total of \$1463.10 in fines and bail in August and gave the following summary of offenses committed: Drunkenness, 199, vagrancy 43, disorderly conduct 11, traffic violations 32, illegal possession of liquor 3, liquor to Indians 2, obtaining money by false pretenses 1, deserter 1, trespassing 1.

Five investigations were made and 13 warrants for delinquency in attending to traffic tickets were issued. Four of 13 persons reported missing were located and three cases were turned over to juvenile court, according to the report.

CHARTER, PARK BOARD VOTE SET

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ordinances. It is understood city councilmen have in mind long terms for park board members, perhaps from five to 10 years.

Objection Raised

City officials said there is no dissatisfaction with the present members of the park board, but that the provision for life-time appointments by the circuit judge is outmoded and it is felt that the park department should function under general control of the mayor and council as do other departments. It is expected present park board members will be appointed if the measure passes.

Salaries Static

In committee discussions of the proposal, some objection was raised on the ground that it would give the park board a political status.

The proposed new charter was worked out by a committee of citizens appointed by Mayor John Houston, working with the council judiciary committee.

It makes no change in the general functions and powers of the various city officers, except that the city recorder would be appointed by the mayor instead of the police judge, as at present. Salaries of elective officers remain the same. There was some discussion of increasing them in the proposed new charter. This suggestion was finally turned down.

Text to Appear

Turned down also were suggestions that the office of police judge be made appointive, and that the police chief be placed on civil service.

Orville Etter, legal consultant of the League of Oregon Cities, assisted the committee in working out the charter proposal.

The full text of the proposed charter will appear soon in a legal publication in The Herald and News.

MATCHES, SMOKERS LEAD FIRE HAZARDS

Matches and careless smokers again led the list of causes of local fires during August, according to Fire Chief Keith K. Ambrose in his report to the city council Tuesday night.

Hot ashes and open fires ran second with eight chalked up to these causes.

The chief reported 35 alarms answered, three of which were false. Seventy-three inspections were made, with seven hazards removed. With city-wide grass burning underway by property owners, the department was kept busy issuing 287 fire permits.

All but \$7.05 of the total fire loss of \$2025.60 was covered by insurance, Ambrose reported, with the sound value of the property at risk estimated at \$293,850.

Camp Requested

The meeting then turned to a discussion of the labor situation. Emory Wirth of the federal employment service told of a 3-day survey made to determine how many laborers elsewhere planned to come to the Klamath basin for the potato harvest. He said the survey showed 1050 workers planning to come here. It was brought out that about 3500 workers are needed for the harvest season.

Bonanza growers submitted a request for a federal farm security mobile camp at Bonanza, where there are 1000 acres of potatoes. Such a camp will be established to serve the Bonanza-Poe valley section, it is expected. Other camps will be at Merrill, Malin and Tulelake.

Parity Discussed

President Main of the Tulelake Growers said that growers in that area are short 50 or 60 men on the grain harvest. Ed Schwartz also reported a labor shortage in the Lower Klamath lake area.

County Agent C. A. Henderson discussed briefly the question of parity and how it may affect the potato industry. He said that clarifying information is awaited, following President Roosevelt's parity statement last weekend.

The parity price of potatoes, as of June 15, was \$1.80 per

ODT Moves to Conserve Public Transportation

Proposing such a step, Senator Green (D-RI) wrote President Roosevelt that extension of rationing beyond the 17 eastern states now affected was the only means "of maintaining our present transportation needs" and of supplying the eastern seaboard with fuel oil for heating this winter.

In making public the letter, Green said automobiles were being withdrawn from the highways at the rate of 1,000,000 a month and that by the end of 1945 there would be but 4,500,000 while "our present economy demands at least 20,000,000 cars to make up for the deficiency of our public transportation systems."
