4 TEACHERS HOLD FORT AT MALIN HIGH

MALIN—Four teachers instead of five are holding the fort at the high school building, while the teaching staff at the elementary building had a new teacher added Tuesday, eliminating the necessity of consolidating the third and fourth grades. Mrs. Irena Jellinek, Malin, will teach the third grade.

Enrollment in the high school and junior high school division at the beginning of the second week was 100, about the same as last year, according to Principal A. E. Street, who expects an additional eight or ten students to enroll later.

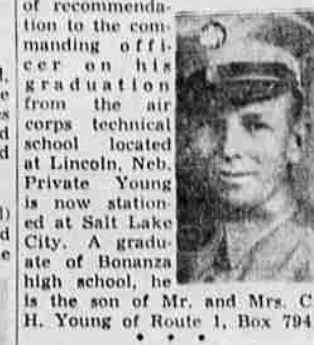
