

# BARUCH ASKS DRASTIC CURB ON MOTORING

an expansion of the present synthetic rubber production program from an annual total now of 705,000 tons to a contemplated figure of 1,100,000 the committee proposed these additional steps:

1. That no speed above 35 miles an hour be permitted for passenger cars and trucks, to prolong the life of tires by nearly 40 per cent.

2. That the average annual mileage per car be held to approximately 5000 miles, and this to be permitted only for "necessary driving."
3. That more rubber be released to the public through re-capping old tires, or the issuance of new ones, so as to maintain fully necessary civilian driving.
4. That a new gasoline rationing system be devised to save tires, based on 5000 miles a year of driving per car.
5. That "the restrictions as to gasoline and mileage be national in their application."

6. That compulsory periodic tire inspections be instituted.
7. That a voluntary tire conservation program be put into effect pending establishment of gas rationing, which the committee said was "the only way of saving rubber."

The committee, appointed on August 6, consisted of Bernard M. Baruch, who was chairman of the war industries board in the last war; Dr. James B. Conant, president of Harvard university, and Dr. Karl F. Compton, president of Massachusetts institute of technology.

Deficit

They told the president bluntly that: "We find the existing situation to be so dangerous that unless corrective measures are taken immediately this country will face both a military and civilian collapse. The naked facts present a warning that dare not be ignored."

Backing up this warning with figures, the committee said total crude rubber supplies available between July 1, 1942 and January 1, 1944 would be 631,000 tons whereas estimated military and other essential demands would total 842,000 tons. And these demands make no allowance for tires for civilian passenger cars.

This leaves a deficit of 211,000 tons which must be met by synthetic rubber production before January 1, 1944.

island under cover of darkness. The navy communique also reported destruction of a large Japanese four-engine flying boat by a naval patrol plane northeast of the Solomons on September 5. The loss boosted to 123 the number of Japanese planes destroyed in the Solomons thus far.

Chief significance of the American blow at Gizo was regarded as indication of a new phase of offensive activity in the strategic Pacific islands and evidence that the American forces had consolidated their positions in the southeastern Solomons.

"It is noteworthy, for instance, that communications of Indian forces defending Bengal and on the Assam frontier have been especially attacked."

sent a warning that DARE not be ignored."

That ought to be enough to convince us of the gravity of the situation and INSURE our cooperation in the necessary rubber conservation measures.

THE committee recommends among other things:

Nation-wide 35-mile speed limit.

5,000-mile annual mileage per car of NECESSARY driving.

Gas rationing on a national basis.

Pending the establishment of gas rationing, the committee pleads for VOLUNTARY tire conservation as the only way of saving rubber.

THERE is no mention in the report of taking away the automobile owner's tires. It is to be assumed (if the committee's recommendations are adopted) that the automobile owner will keep what he has, making them last as long as possible. When they are gone, he will be OUT.

If that can be made certain, there will be sincere voluntary cooperation with the conservation measures recommended.

Up to now, the threat has always been held over our heads that our tires will be taken away. Human nature being what it is, the result has been that people have been getting all the mileage they could while they STILL HAD TIRES.

Thus waste has been promoted. THE committee's report leaves no doubt that the situation is serious. Its recommendations seem reasonable and SOUND.

In the interval before they are put into effect, they should be voluntarily followed.

Other enlisted reservists deferred will be honorably discharged from the reserve as of December 31 and made responsible to the selective service.

Stimson made a number of other announcements, including disclosure that the air transport command had opened its ranks to women with the establishment of an experimental unit of women pilots for ferrying operations within the United States.

Mrs. Nancy Harkness Love, 28, Boston, wife of Lt. Col. Robert M. Love, deputy chief of staff of the air transport command, will head the unit and is thus far the only pilot engaged for it.

The unit, to be known as the Women's Auxiliary Ferrying Squadron, will have an initial strength of about 50, with civil service status. About 40 will be active pilots, the others being assigned to administrative duties. Pay will be \$3000 a year.

Caucasus Breakthrough  
Soviet withdrawals west of Stalingrad were described as orderly, carried out under attack by endless waves of German bombers, and there was no suggestion of a major Nazi breakthrough.

# Lumber Wage Case Hearing Planned For Five States

James E. Fadling, first vice president of the CIO International Woodworkers of America, labor representative of portions of the hearing involving the IWA. Woods was further reported to have said that D. F. Pearson was being considered as a representative of the AFL Lumber and Sawmill Workers union to sit in place of Fadling when the hearing involved the LSW.

Owre said that it is not the existence of an actual controversy which has caused the board to plan such a hearing but, according to Woods, it is the belief of the army, navy, war production board and the WLB that "chaos exists in the lumber industry due to wage disagreement" and the disputes are adversely affecting lumber production.

Plans Completed  
Owre said that Woods had informed the PIRC, an association of more than 40 lumber operators in southern Oregon and northern California, that all lumber operators who could be reached would be made parties to the proposed hearing whether they were presently engaged in a wage controversy or not.

Woods is now in Washington, D. C., and has announced that when he returns to Seattle next Monday all plans for the

hearing will have been completed.

Large Scope  
In announcing the protest, Owre said that the PIRC feels that a pine expert should be included on the panel particularly if Fadling and Pearson, union representatives who have been active in pine wage negotiations, are named to the panel.

"The tremendous scope and importance of the proposed hearing makes it essential that western pine operators be represented on the panel by someone other than an attorney for Washington plywood interests," Owre declared.

The PIRC man said that in the light of a report on the WLB's case No. 294, a fir dispute, "It is obvious that the war labor board panel list that case had no conception of the differences between western pine, fir and plywood operations." "Rather," he said, "the war labor board considered these three industries to be identical and had assumed that settlement of a problem in one of the industries would effect settlement of the same problem in other industries."

Wage-Hour Intact  
The announcement also explained that the elimination of double-time pay for particular days makes the practice universal as "many unions already have modified their contracts to put this pledge into effect."

The decree did not affect the wage-hour act provision allowing payment for work over 40 hours a week at the rate of time and a half.

The order is effective October 1.

the battle, bombing and machine-gunning the Japanese continually.

There was no official indication of the size of the forces which the Japanese had thrown into the offensive, but it was evident they were employing seasoned jungle fighters trained in the infiltration tactics which played such a large part in their successes in Malaya.

The brief announcement disclosing the Japanese advance said the invaders had successfully outflanked Australian positions at Myola on the north side of the towering Owen Stanley range, pushed through a pass and again outflanked defenses at Elogi on the southern side of the summit, 12 miles nearer Port Moresby.

The invaders thus have traversed approximately 16 miles since they launched their push from Kokoda several days ago and now are considerably more than halfway across the 120-mile wide arm of southeastern New Guinea.
