WEYERHAEUSER MEN GO TO POLLS TODAY

More than 900 Weyerhaeuser Timber company mill employees went to the polls this afternoon to vote for union representation in a national labor relations board run-off ballot involving three labor organizations.

Scheduled to be held in the Weyerhaeuser hotel, balloting will continue from 2:30 until 6:30. An earlier NLRB election resulted in no majority for any of the contending unions.

The ballot will be split into two classifications: machinists, machinists' helpers and allied work, and regular production employees. Machinists will vote for the AFL, International Association of Machinists, the AFL Lumber and Sawmill Workers union or the CIO International Woodworkers of America. Production employees will vote for either the AFL-LSW or the CIO-IOWA.

If the AFL-IAM fails to poll a majority in the machinists' classification, the unit will become a part of the production classification and the entire election determined as one group.

On the previous ballot a "no union" designation was included but dropped on today's runoff.

Body of Flier Missing in Action Taken From Plane

GEN. MACARTHUR'S HEADQUARTERS, Australia, Sept. 10 (AP)—The body of Second Lieut. Jack R. Peres of San Bernardino, flier missing since he was in air action February 10 over Darwin, was recovered from the wreckage of his plane yesterday.

Peres was posthumously awarded the distinguished service cross by General Douglas MacArthur for extraordinary heroism in action. His P-40 plane, deteriorating under the fire sun and its sides bullet-pitted, was found in a section of the country known as "The Black Fellows' Jungle." It was 20 miles from the main road but in a section seldom traversed. The wreckage was surrounded by newlygrown undergrowth.

ONION SEED GROWN
