You who plan to wake early enough to line up for reserved seat grid tickets next Monday morning at the chamber of commerce may, by edict of the Office of Klamath Union High School Information or a source behind the screen thereof, NOT buy more than six tickets. That is, at one time. You may still go back to the end of the line and start over, but if the line is half as long as that of previous years, you'd better bring your lunch.

The pronouncement came smack on top of the OKUHSI's communique No. 5, released two days ago but withheld for reasons of security by the Office of Censor and Prevention of Aid and Comfort to Enemy of The Herald and News Sports Department—commonly and briefly termed the OCPACENSD, annotated.

The balance of the communique, in words suitable for public consumption, disclosed that the aforementioned reserved tickets are for the entire season only and will market at \$1.25 for the five games.

However, you may also buy single reserved seat passes, good for next week's opening game only, for two-bits.

Thusly, you may buy either a reserved seat for the Grant game or a reserved seat good for all season. You may NOT buy a reserved seat good for a single game other than the first one. Single game reserved seats will be put on sale each week preceding the engagement they're good for.

Get it? Also, however, you may buy a season general admission pass for \$2.20 including tax. Which means if you wish to see each of the five games from a reserved seat it will cost you \$3.45.

Oh, yes, the sale begins at 8 o'clock—that's a m.—Monday at the chamber of commerce office at 323 Main street.

COAST ELEVENS SETTLE DOWN TO DRILLS

Fewer Candidates, Equal Pep Noted; 50 Answer Call at Oregon; Stiner Bans Bowl Talk

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 11 (AP)—Football practice was under way in earnest today for the ten schools of the Pacific Coast conference and the major independent, with considerably fewer candidates on hand in most cases but no lack of enthusiasm in this war year.

The season started officially yesterday as coaches—many of them new to the loop—counted their squads tongue in cheek and put them to work loosening muscles for the brief practice whirl preceding opening games, only a couple of weeks away for some teams.

Schools with slim turnouts took heart in the new conference ruling limiting squads to 28 men.

University of California, as usual, had the biggest crop—80 men, and among them was the crackback halfback, Jim Jurkovich, whose brilliancy has been a sad factor in his pligkin

career. If Jurkovich stays healthy he may be the Bears' top ball-carrier this year.

Coach L. B. (Stub) Allison admitted his California squad looked pretty good, and allowed that "we should knock off some teams."

Stanford had a slim turnout of 39, but the new Indian coach, Marchie Schwartz, took heart in the unexpected return of Ed Stamm, brilliant tackle, who wanted to join the navy but was told to go back to school and finish his engineering studies.

Oregon State, the defending conference champion and Rose Bowl winner last New Year's day, has 15 lettermen returning from the 1941 campaign, but the rest of the 37-man squad is largely green. Coach Lon Stiner warned the boys not to coast on past glories because "we haven't the team we had last year."

Seven track stars — which

might indicate a fleet backfield —donned football togs at the University of Southern California, where Jeff Cravath is head coach replacing Lieut. Commander Sam Barry. The Trojan squad totaled 56 men.

Coach Babe Horrell lost no time putting his 52 University of California at Los Angeles Bruins to work for their opener—always a tough one—with Texas Christian two weeks hence.

University of Oregon had an all-time low turnout of 38 men, but before the drill was over 50 were on the field to give John Warren, the new coach, some measure of cheer. Twenty lettermen were on hand.

Coach Ralph (Pest) Welch of University of Washington had a more dismal outlook, with a squad of only 39 players—15 of them sophomores, but Washington State college's veteran coach Orin (Babe) Hollingbery seemed happy enough with what

he called a "surprisingly good" turnout of 33.

EUGENE, Sept. 11 (AP)—The smallest University of Oregon football squad in recent years reported for the opening of the Pacific Coast conference's pre-season practice period here Thursday morning — to a new head mentor and one assistant.

But by afternoon the 38-man turnout had swelled to 50. Honest John Warren, freshman coach for six years before his elevation to head coach with the appointments of both Tex Oliver and Vaughn Corley, head and line coaches, respectively, to the navy, was welcomed by a squad, including 20 lettermen and 17 sophomores up from last year's undefeated freshman squad. Warren is being assisted by Manny Vezie, former Notre Dame star end and coach who is the only remaining member of the 1941 varsity grid coaching staff.

The players received their equipment in the morning and went on press parade for photographers. The first workout in the 16-day period prior to the opening game — against Tex Oliver's St. Mary's Navy Flyers from Moraga in Portland September 26—was held yesterday afternoon.

Missing from the early arrivals was Tony Crish, veteran two-year letterman end, who is expected to report later. Roy Ell, blocking quarterback two years ago, was counted out when he announced he would play in the Northwest Industrial league with the Portland "Busters."

Warren will hold "daily double" workouts until the week of the St. Mary's game when he will order one drill per day. Warren and Vezie will be supplemented in the coaching chore by the part-time assistance of Ray Segale, star guard for the past three seasons, and Anse Cornell, graduate manager.

Segale will help with the line, and Cornell will handle the freshmen.

CORVALLIS, Sept. 11 (AP)—Rose Bowl talk was out at the Oregon State college football lot today as the Pacific Coast conference champion Beavers continued 1942 training.

Coach Lon Stiner welcomed 37 varsity aspirants yesterday, 15 of them lettermen and several of them veterans of the January 1 victory over Duke.

"The first guy I hear mention the Rose Bowl will get it in the neck," Stiner warned. "We haven't the team we had last year."

Two players were conspicuously missing—Lloyd Wickett, tackle, who is in Alaska unable to get transportation home, and Bob Cole, reserve center, who has been inducted into the army.

Stiner will be assisted this season by Luke Gill, former Hawaii university coach.

The National league's stirring pennant struggle assumes a new and even more vivid hue today as the Brooklyn Dodgers and St. Louis Cardinals come together for their final, fateful series.

If the Redbirds can beat Brooklyn today and tomorrow, they will be even with the Dodgers for the first time this season—and will move from Ebbs field to Philadelphia with a great opportunity to grab the lead.

For while the Cardinals are tackling the tail-end Phils four times in three days, the schedule calls for Brooklyn to play only twice. Thus if the Cards are able to rout the Dodgers and keep on winning at Philadelphia, there is nothing Brooklyn can do to keep them from moving into first place, at least temporarily.

That explains how control of the race suddenly has slipped from the Dodgers' hands. They let go on it with a humiliating 10-2 defeat by the Chicago Cubs in Brooklyn yesterday while the Redbirds were raiding the New York Giants 5-1 across town at the Polo Grounds.

In the American league yesterday both the New York Yankees and Boston Red Sox were defeated.

The Yanks were shutout by the St. Louis Browns 9-0 on the three-hit pitching of Dennis Galehouse as Walt Juddich batted in five runs. The Red Sox were noosed out 5-4 at Detroit even though Ted Williams collected his 31st homer of the year and Dom DiMaggio also notched one.

The Chicago White Sox and Washington Senators split a twilight-night doubleheader. Chicago took the first 7-1 with Ted Lyons hurling seven-hit ball for his 13th triumph, then Washington won the night game 5-4 on Bruce Campbell's single with the bases loaded in the eighth.

Semi-Pro 'World Series' Held Off Until Next Spring

NEW YORK, Sept. 11 (AP)—Semi-pro baseball's annual "world series" scheduled to be held at Havana, Cuba, Oct. 1-12, has been postponed until next spring, President Ray Dumont of the National Semi-Pro Baseball congress announced here today.

Dumont said the inability to guarantee United States players transportation to Cuba was the principal reason for the postponement. The decision was reached jointly by Dumont and James Marinen, national sports director of Cuba.

The Boeing Bombers of Wichita, Kas., 1942 national semi-pro champions, will be eligible to represent the United States in the spring series. Dates for the series, which will be for the best-of-seven games, will be set later.

Cochrane Walloped By Zivic

Veteran Gives Welterweight Champ Decisive Whipping

NEW YORK, Sept. 11 (AP)—Red Cochrane still is the welterweight champion of the world today, but there is no doubt that Fritz Zivic is the champion of Red Cochrane.

Cochrane, on leave from the navy to fight for the USO before going on active sea duty, received a belt emblematic of the title at Madison Square garden last night, but that was nothing to the belts he took from the veteran Pittsburgh ringmaster in the 10-round bout which followed immediately.

As a result of his victory over the pudgy red-head, Zivic will meet another former welter king, Henry Armstrong, who is bouncing along the comeback trail after losing the crown to Zivic October 4, 1940, and failing to regain it in a return match two months later. The bout probably will be held November 6.

Although carrying enough ballast to make him list as a result of the water he was forced to drink so he could come in over the 147-pound limit, Zivic ripped and slashed and thoroughly befuddled the tenacious Cochrane over the 10-round route to win as he pleased and gain revenge for the defeat 14 months ago that cost him the title.

Neayland's Eleven Meets Three Pro Opponents in Nine Days; Soldiers Big

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Sept. 11 (AP)—New York. . . New York Giants, tomorrow. . . Baltimore. . . Brooklyn Dodgers, next Wednesday night. . . Boston. . . Chicago Bears, four days later. . . That's the tough assignment the eastern all-army football squad headed for today with the metropolis as its first bivouac.

"You can say," said Col. Bob Neayland, the head coach, as the husky soldiers completed a five-weeks training assignment here last night, "that I preserved my usual pessimistic silence."

"We're satisfied that we are as well prepared" for the three-game - within - nine - days - army emergency relief fund program as any all-star team could be," went on the colonel, who pointed out that although practice began here August 5, many of his leading players were several weeks late in reporting.

To a neutral observer, who has watched the army squad develop from a slow, hard-hitting eleven to a speedy slambang, coordinated outfit with a devastating aerial attack, the team leaves the impression that it's going to be an extremely tough one to lick.

He has indicated however, that it will include an all-professional backfield of bonecrusher Norm Standlee, Stanford and Chicago Bears; Johnny Pingel, Michigan State and Detroit Lions; Harold Van Every, Minnesota and Green Bay Packers, and Vic Spadaccini, Minnesota and Cleveland Rams.

The line, averaging 213 pounds, consists of Jack Russell, Baylor, and Bob Friedlund, Michigan State, ends; Hodges West, Tennessee and Philadelphia Eagles, and John Mellus, Villanova and New York Giants, tackles; Al Baisi, West Virginia and Chicago Bears, and Bob Sherrod, Texas Christian, guards, and Tom Greenfield, Arizona and Green Bay Packers, center.
