

SKILLED MEN FROM 18 TO 50 TO BE ENLISTED

According to an announcement from the U. S. army recruiting service, authority has just been received to enlist applicants as specialists in the army air forces between the ages of 18 and 50, also men who meet the physical standards for limited service as prescribed under the selective service regulations.

Mechanics of all types are needed for this assignment and all men who have mechanical experience of any kind are offered an opportunity to serve with the air forces in the very important capacity of aircraft mechanic, aircraft armorer, aircraft sheetmetal worker, welder and many other vitally necessary skills required to "keep 'em flying."

Skills That Qualify

A few of the civilian skills which qualify for aircraft training are: automobile mechanic, tractor mechanic, diesel mechanic, electrician, farm mechanic, maintenance mechanic, appliance serviceman, office machine serviceman, refrigeration mechanic, welder, sheetmetal worker, radio mechanic, telephone mechanic, gunsmith, watchmaker, oil burner serviceman, electric meter installer, locksmith, elevator repairman, telegrapher, and many others too numerous to mention.

Full information may be obtained at the army recruiting office, 219 Postoffice building. Immediate enlistment may be expected by those who are able to qualify. Applicants who have received a 1-B classification from the selective service may also apply for limited service.

The Cole Brothers circus will unload at Oak street and the Southern Pacific tracks. Circus equipment, animals, etc., will then move to Broad street, on Broad to East Main street, on East Main street to South Sixth, and out South Sixth to the circus grounds at South Sixth and Division streets.

Shipyard Workers Told to Refuse To Wear "Numbers"

SEATTLE, Sept. 11 (AP)—Shipyard workers at the Seattle-Tacoma Shipbuilding corporation plant at Harbor Island were advised by the Boilermakers' union today to refuse to wear helmets with identifying numbers, and if given such helmets to turn them back to foreman.

Dan McKillop, assistant business agent, said protests had been made to the company and to the metal trades council. "Our men are not in the penitentiary and they don't have to wear identifying numbers," he said.

He said employees told him the numbers were planned to help company guards identify certain workers.

PIRC Votes Down Blanket Draft Deferment Petition

The Pine Industrial Relations Committee has voted against petitioning the Klamath county selective service boards for blanket deferment for all lumber workers in the area, Merton T. Owre of the PIRC said today.

The action followed a CIO International Woodworkers of America request that the PIRC join the union in signing a resolution to that effect passed by the labor group's Klamath Basin District council, Owre said.

He said the PIRC believed that blanket deferment was contrary to the policy of the national selective service system and that the system was not granting blanket deferment even to munitions or shipyard workers.

The union resolution said: "RESOLVED—That all employers and all unions in the lumber industry call this matter (of blanket deferment) to the attention of selective service boards, requesting deferment in both sawmill and woods of men in all job classifications in the industry."
