

1500 GERMANS SACRIFICED IN HUGE ASSAULT

Gen. Von Bock might be preparing still another offensive. Meanwhile, the first snows of approaching winter fell in the high ranges of the Caucasus, where the soviet command reported more than 2000 Germans were killed and 90 tanks burned out in a five-day battle to destroy axis bridgeheads in the Terek river valley.

In the northwest Caucasus, the Russians acknowledge the fall of the Black sea naval base at Novorossiisk, 70 miles below the Kerch strait, and indicated that the red armies were withdrawing toward the port of Tuapse, 75 miles farther down the coast.

any longer," then "balled out." It was his first parachute jump. "I'm trying to figure out what happened—I couldn't say definitely—just that the engine caught on fire," he asserted. "I certainly tried—I certainly tried to put out the flames before I jumped."

Killed outright were Laverne Voelker, 20, Buffalo; James E. Collins, 50, Buffalo; Francis Ryan, 37, Kenmore, N. Y.; and Samuel Shalala, Buffalo. Lester Glenn, a civilian employed as a U. S. army inspector, died six hours later in a hospital.

Paul Chase, 41, of Glens Falls, N. Y.; Martin Till, Frank Warda, Salvatore Palmeri, Joseph Sciolino, 47, Carlson Ranch and Norman Savage succumbed early today.

An injured workman, Winston J. Dandrea, 24, who was standing almost under where the plane struck, asserted the impact was like a "bombing—that's what we thought it was at first."

"First there was the crash of the plane through the roof and then, almost simultaneously, it seemed, a blinding flash occurred as the plane exploded," he related.

DEATH OF MANERO HELD ACCIDENTAL

Investigation by city police into the death of Mario Manero, Italian alien whose body was found in the canal under the Main street bridge yesterday morning, reveals that he was probably drowned accidentally.

Records showed that police headquarters received a call on the night of September 7 from the Hillside hospital, reporting that one Mario Manero who had been receiving treatment there for delirium tremens had walked out about 3:30 a. m. It is assumed that he staggered into the canal, a victim to his condition and the darkness.

Dr. George Adler, coroner, said that an autopsy would not be held, since there was no external evidence of violence.

Police have been unable to locate any relatives of the man, they said.

THE battle of Stalingrad is described as the greatest battle of the war. Yet FIVE other battles are raging on the 1300-mile Russian front. That will give you some idea of the scope of the war in Russia.

READING the news of the past week, one can't avoid the idea that the whole world is waiting tensely for the outcome of the fighting at Stalingrad and in the Caucasus and that little of importance will happen until the trend of the fighting in Russia becomes more clearly apparent.

WEATHER note—perhaps significant. Snow is falling in the higher levels of the Caucasus mountains, and cold rains are drenching the Russian front from Stalingrad to Leningrad.

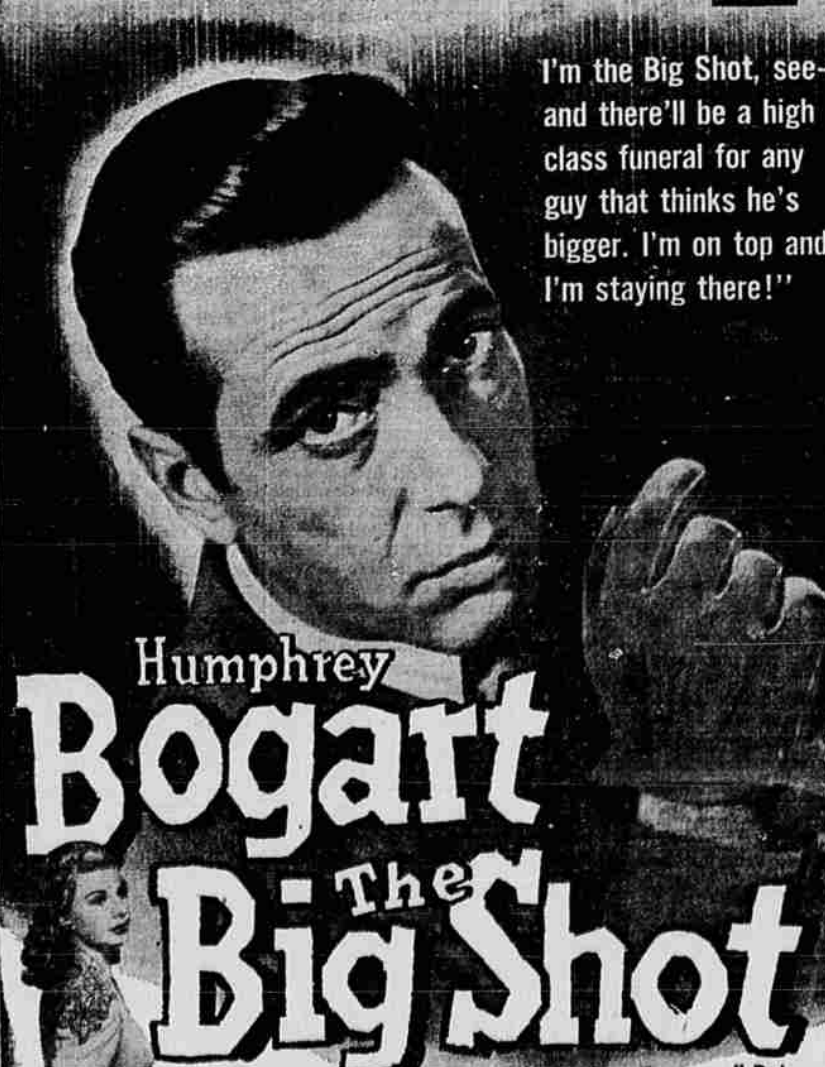

bacco to 15 cents and approved house-adopted schedules increasing the taxes on both 10-cent-a-package cigarettes and the regular 15 cent brands from \$3.25 to \$3.50 per thousand. Taxes on

larger cigarettes would be upped from \$7.80 to \$8.40 per thousand.

Profit Limitation Chairman George (D-Ga.) said the committee voted to raise the annual tax on gaming devices such as slot machines from the house-approved figure of \$50 to \$100.

An over-all limitation of 5 per cent on war profits may be considered by the committee, members said.

Chairman George (D-Ga.) told reporters the committee expected to take up the question of re-

pealing or amending the present law giving the army and navy authority to renegotiate war contracts to scale down profits. He said such action might be considered in separate legislation or made a part of the tax bill.
