AFL SIGNS WITH DORRIS COMPANY

The AFL Lumber and Sawmill workers has signed a collective bargaining contract with the Associated Lumber and Box company at Dorris, Klamath Basin District Council President Hugh Haddock announced today.

Haddock said the pact includes a modified union shop clause and provisions for vacation with pay and seniority rights.

Approximately 60 men will be covered under terms of the agreement, he said.

Haddock also revealed the AFL-LSW is negotiating a contract with the Ralph L. Smith Lumber company in Alturas.

SPUD HARVEST UNDERWAY IN TULELAKE AREA

Potato harvest is already getting well underway in the Tulelake and stateline area, according to Charles Paddock, manager of the Tulelake Farm Security administration camp. More than 50 persons are now living in the camp with more families arriving daily. A farm placement office, installed in the camp Wednesday, is now taking growers' orders for labor and routing workers to potato and wheat harvest jobs.

The Farm Security camp at Malin will be in operation by September 20, Paddock said, and the camp at Merrill, located this year in the CCC camp two miles north of town, will open September 25. All camps will have farm placement offices for routing of farm labor to the potato harvest, and a field representative of the U. S. employment service will check labor needs throughout the Basin.

Offices Open
Jack Almeter, manager of the Klamath branch of the United States Employment service, said that Scotty Redfield has been placed in charge of a USES office in the Tulelake area. He recommended that all Tulelake area employers contact him to fill harvest hand needs.

Alder said that a second USES representative will join Redfield next week and disclosed that USES offices will be opened in Malin on September 15 and Merrill on September 20.

Services Available
Paddock emphasized that the FSA camps are open to resident as well as migrant families, and urged that city dwellers who plan to help in the war harvest arrange to stay at grower or FSA camps adjacent to harvest work so that valuable rubber, gasoline and time will not be lost going to and from work.

Shelter, laundries, showers, ironing and sewing facilities, limited medical care, community recreation and entertainment will all be available to resident

families who stay in FSA camps. Their children will also be eligible for the hot lunch and nursery programs, which enable mothers of small children to do harvest work with the assurance that their children will be well taken care of.

Program Planned
Residents of the Tulelake FSA camp will hold their first camp meeting Monday night, Paddock said, and will elect a mayor and camp council to administer the camp's affairs. Plans have already been made for providing a community woodpile with funds collected as weekly camp dues and a jukebox will probably be installed for camp dances and entertainments.

Camp talent will also go on the air over radio station KFJI early next week when FSA camp residents launch the first of a series of weekly potato harvest programs.

CAPT. LAPHAM HERE FOR INSPECTION

Capt. E. B. Lapham of the U. S. navy was in Klamath Falls Friday and Saturday on his annual tour of recruiting stations in the western division, of which he is in charge. His headquarters are in San Francisco.

Lapham has seen 35 years of service with the navy, having graduated from the Naval academy at Annapolis in 1911. He was in active duty during the Mexican campaign, and World War I in addition to having made two tours of duty in China.

Lapham expressed himself as pleased with the work of the recruiting station here and emphasized that the navy will continue to accept volunteer enlistments regardless of what action is taken in regard to selective service. He also reiterated that men may enlist in the navy right up to the time of their induction into the army through local draft boards.

Lapham's duties take him over all of the western states and as far east as Nebraska. He was accompanied by Mrs. Lapham on his trip here and left Saturday for Medford by way of Crater Lake.

MORE WOMEN SOUGHT FOR KAISER JOBS

The Kaiser Shipbuilding corporation is seeking more women to fill welding and sheet metal jobs but does not want men from essential industries. C. V. Patterson, a Kaiser representative, said here this week.

Patterson said, however, that jobs for expert electricians and machinists are open and that the company is opening more and more job classifications to women.

Housing Eased
He said that women welders are paid \$1.20 per hour and sheet metal helpers get 95 cents per hour.

The housing situation near the Portland and Vancouver shipyards is greatly eased, he disclosed, with the opening of 500 houses for families and additional dormitories for single women.

Workers Asked
Coincidentally, the War Production Training school announced today that it had an order for all women aviation sheet metal trainees in the local classes who have completed more than 90 hours of instruction, thereby making room for more applicants.

School officials said that applicants must be between the ages of 18 and 35 and pass a physical exam before they are accepted. The sheet metal class runs from 9 a. m. to 3:30 p. m. six days per week.
