

Women Voters to Open Program

Program and Tea Arranged for Tuesday As Members Gather in Library Rooms.

Members of the Klamath County League of Women Voters began their year's work with flying colors Tuesday afternoon with an orientation meeting and a delightful tea complementing those who have joined the organization this year. Mrs. Everett R. Dennis, new president of the league, presided, and chairmen of study groups and committee chairmen were introduced.

Mrs. Dennis conducted the introductory orientation and presented a general picture of the league and its aims.

Mrs. Howard Hanville was in charge of arrangements for the tea which followed the program, and was assisted by Mrs. Lloyd Emery, Mrs. Lafayette Stephens and Mrs. George Rogers.

Punch was served from an attractive table in the small parlor off the club room of the city library.

League meetings will be held this year on the first Monday afternoon and the third Monday evening of each month. The next meeting is scheduled for Monday evening, September the twenty-first, and will be devoted to study of the city charter. Mrs. Nelson Reed will be in charge of the program. The afternoon meeting set for Monday, October the fifth, will also be on the city charter, with Mrs. Reed presiding. All meetings are held in the small club room of the city library.

In her opening remarks, Mrs. Dennis outlined the origin of the National League of Women Voters as an outgrowth of women's suffrage. "After women obtained the vote," Mrs. Dennis said, "it was felt that they needed instruction in using their votes intelligently. League principles foster education in good citizenship and laboratory methods in instruction in government and its operation are advocated," she said.

Broad aims of the league are to watch local government, work toward electing a better congress and disseminate information to the public. Special study of wartime activities is also a branch of this year's work, the president pointed out.

The fall program adopted by the state league and to be followed by the local branch includes the study of the following bills which are to be voted on by the state legislature: establishment of the merit system for state employees, county school reorganization plan and education.

Mrs. Paul Buck, wartime activities chairman, who was introduced by the president, outlined plans for introducing league "broadside" timely leaflets on vital subjects, to the public.

Mrs. H. P. Bosworth, legislative and radio chairman, told of plans for activities in these branches for the coming year.

Study group chairmen presented their outlines for work during the coming year, and members were given an opportunity to enroll for the groups in which they were most vitally interested.
