They're singing "The St. Louis Blues" in Flatbush today and the cause of it all is Morton Cooper, first 20-game winner of 1942 among the pitchers of the major leagues but strictly a pain in the pennant race to the Brooklyn Dodgers.

Cooper, who forms the front end of the only brother battery now intact in the majors, carved out his 20th triumph yesterday with one of the most impressive performances of his career and probably the most important. He pitched the St. Louis Cardinals to a 3-0 shutout over the Dodgers, holding them to three scattered hits as the Missourians chopped Brooklyn's advantage over them in the National league flag chase to a single game.

He collected two of his team's eight blows, starting both of the Cardinal run-making sprees and tallying each time against the ace of the Brooklyn curving corps, John Whitlow Wyatt.

It was the eighth shutout of the season for Cooper and his fifth triumph over the Dodgers, three of which have been shutouts at Ebbets field.

The big right hander didn't let a man get past first base. He walked one and struck out three—Dolph Camilli twice and Pinch Hitter Lew Riggs, the latter with a man on base.

Thus the Cards, who hold an edge of 12 games to nine over the Dodgers this season, have only to repeat yesterday's performance to take over a half interest in first place.

The finale of the series promises to be a duel between a couple of southpaws named Max—Lanier of the Cardinals and Macon of the Brooks.

In the American league, the front-running New York Yankees also are finding the path to the pennant a little rough, having failed to score in their last 23 innings, but they still stand nine games to the good.

The Chicago White Sox handed the Yanks their second straight shutout yesterday as Ed Smith shaded Alton Donald in a

pitching duel, 1-0. A single by Don Kolloway brought in the only run.

Boston's second place Red Sox picked up a full game by walloping the Cleveland Indians, 15-2, on a 17-hit attack. Tony Lupien started the parade with a three-run double off Jim Bagby in the opening frame.

Elsewhere in the junior circuit, the Philadelphia Athletics stopped the Detroit Tigers, 5-4, and the St. Louis Browns whipped the Washington Senators, 10-4.

Two other games in the National league saw the New York Giants edge out the Chicago Cubs, 4-3, and the Cincinnati Reds beat the Philadelphia Phils, 8-5, in 11 innings.

Pittsburgh's scheduled double-header at Boston was postponed until today because of weather.

SEATTLE, Sept. 12 (AP)—Aerial prospects for the University of Washington football team appeared on the up and up today as the squad faced its first light scrimmage session.

Passing was the order of the day in yesterday's workout, and Coach Ralph (Pest) Welch was impressed with the timing, fast breaking and deadly snaggings of Ends Fred Olson, Jack Tracy and Arnold Weinmeister. The latter is a Portlander from last year's Frosh eleven. Halfbacks Bob Erickson, Pete Susick and Fred Provo all showed accuracy in their throwing.

Grange Favors Utah in 'Forgotten' Big Seven

Defending Champs Given Nod Over Colorado, Swing From T to Single Wing

Football's forgotten theatre is the Rockies, an area which has produced such phenomenal operatives as Dutch Clark and Whizzer White and plays consistently top-flight ball.

Year after year teams in this sector stage spirited battles for sectional honors but fail to make much of a dent in the national scene. It is not the fault of the players or coaches. Rather it indicates a need for a peculiar type of promotional genius which can provide the vitamins of football health.

In the Big Seven, the 1942 pictures may be summed up as follows:

Favorite: Utah.
Contender: Colorado.
Long shot: Denver.
UTAH SHIFTS FROM T TO SINGLE WING

Ike Armstrong's defending champions at Utah are going against the football trend this season. They are shifting from the T formation to the single wing. A reconstructed backfield working behind a capable line should push the Utes to another crown.

A power backfield with Sophomores Frank Nelson and Tally Stevens and Veterans Woody Peterson and Scatback Tom Evans will carry the mail. The line is particularly sound at the tackles and center.

If Colorado welds a backfield to work behind a fine veteran line, the Boulder boys could cop the plums. The secondary is geared to Tex Reilly, Glen Hedgecock and Carl Stearns.

Ellison Ketchum has replaced Maj. Cack Hubbard at Denver and if Sophomores Gene Voris and Tom Saracino step according to the form sheet, the Pioneers are going to pull a lot of surprises. Howie Schechtel, Johnny Mohar and Bob Riddell are capable backs. Leon Diner, Bill Schumacher and Gregg Browning peg the line.

Colorado State is backfield rich. Lewis (Dude) Dent is a cinch for district laurels and his teammates, Chet Maeda and Sophomore Dario Mariano, are more than adequate. In the line the Aggies have Mel Roebecker, center, and a pair of fancy flankers in Dub Roberts and Chuck Muller.

Brigham Young moves down a peg with only nine returning veterans. Among the stalwarts back for another whirl are Mike Mills, end, who is the sector's leading candidate for national recognition, Reed Nilson, center, and Ken Bird, tackle. The backfield is weak with Mark Weed, quarterback, carrying the load.

TWO-WAY BATTLE IN ROCKY MOUNTAIN LOOP
Utah State has a corking right halfback and kicker in Bill Twitchell and a pair of good looking newcomers in the backfield in George Nelson and Bill Russell. Mel Wood is a capable back.

Bunny Oakes farms the best freshman squad in the history of Wyoming. If his boys can play major league ball in their debut year, he may have a real spoiler. Earl Ray and Dom Feeley are the kingpins in the forward wall.

Colorado college and Colorado Mines will fight it out in the Rocky Mountain conference. Greeley and Montana State should be close contenders.

Lon Stiner Admits Beavers in Race for Title

CORVALLIS, Ore., Sept. 12 (AP)—Coach Lon Stiner of Oregon State college admitted today that his football team should be a contender for the Coast conference title this fall.

But he insisted the Beavers, who have 15 lettermen back from the squad which won in the transplanted Rose bowl, should be ranked below California's Bears, whom he favors for the title, and Washington State.

Ranking even with Oregon State are Washington, Stanford and Southern California, he said.

In practice Stiner continued to cast about for a quarterback. George Peters, last year's quarterback, was graduated, and Warren Simas, who was scheduled to take his place, entered the army. Then Bob Keiser, sophomore understudy, was declared ineligible by Commissioner Edwin Atherton.

Stiner has been experimenting with two inexperienced sophomores, Ralph Harper and Bob Stevens.

EUGENE, Sept. 12 (AP)—The late arrival of two lettermen, End Jim Shepard and Halfback Kenny Oliphant, brought the University of Oregon's football "nose count" to 52—surprisingly large in view of Coach John Warren's expectation of between 38 and 40.

The Webfoots, after two days of "daily doubles" cut this morning's practice and were to hold a dummy scrimmage this afternoon. Warren was pleased with the morale of the squad,

but not its physical condition. He praised the early-season work of two halfbacks—Tommy Roblin and Roy "Tippy" Dyer.

The Oregons, who open against St. Mary's Pre-flight Aviators in Portland September 26, are expected to get their first scrimmage by mid-week.

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The boys played in the national AAU basketball championship tournament last year in Denver, and reportedly have been barred

from further football competition under a rule that college athletes may play only for teams representing their school. The college has asked reinstatement for Kennedy and Stoves but so far has heard nothing.

COOPERS HAPPY
BROOKLYN, Sept. 12 (AP)—James Cooper, U. S. Navy and kid brother of the St. Louis Cardinal battery of Morton and Walker Cooper, dropped over to Ebbets field from the Brooklyn navy yard yesterday and watched his brothers defeat the Dodgers.

He was out-rooted by about 30,000 to 1 but went home happy over brother Mort's 3 to 0 triumph.
