including munitions, from this country.

**Aid to Russia**  
Lend-lease help is now being provided at the rate of \$8,000,000 a year, with the maximum aid possible under 15 separate appropriation acts reaching almost \$83,000,000,000.

At present, the report said, about 35 per cent of lend-lease exports were going to the United Kingdom, 35 per cent to Russia, and 30 per cent to the middle east, Australia and other areas.

**Larger Still**  
"Aid to China," it was added, "has been limited by the difficulty of transportation, but the development of other means of transportation will relieve this situation."

The president said in his letter that deliveries of lend-lease goods, "which have been growing, will have to grow much larger still."

Compared with their available resources, he said, Britain and Russia had produced more weapons than the United States.

"And they are continuing to produce to the limit," he asserted, "in spite of the fact that Russia is a battlefield and Britain an offensive base."

To show that lend-lease is not entirely a one-way proposition, the report said that in Great Britain 250,000 British workmen were engaged on construction for the American army in July alone.

IT is reasonably certain that at the root of it lies a German scheme to put Frenchmen to work for Germany.

MAKING ARMS FOR GERMANS TO USE.

THERE is little news today from New Guinea. There is none (as this is written) from the Solomons. There is none from China. There is none from Egypt.

Russia is the big show.

ONE can't avoid the feeling that all the world is waiting for the outcome of the titanic struggle in southern Russia and that little will happen elsewhere until that great conflict is concluded.

But don't get the idea that nothing is being DONE elsewhere.

That impression is being conveyed by the absence of news from the rest of the world, but absence of news doesn't mean absence of PREPARATION. It is more probable that absence of news means only that the censorship has been tightened.

You may be quite sure that behind the curtain of censorship active preparations are being made for what will happen after the battle in Russia dies down.

## COMPULSORY LABOR LAW FACES FRENCH

gascar and Marshal Petain's trip Saturday to the air department.

There is no limitation on where persons drafted for labor under the law may be sent, although full details on how it would be applied were not published at once. Still uncertain was the question of how foreigners resident in France would be affected.

### Obligatory

Infractions of the law are punishable by prison sentences ranging up to five years and by fines up to 30,000 gold francs. These penalties may be doubled in the case of second offenders.

The law contains a clause declaring that "every head of an enterprise will be obliged to conform to instructions which he may receive from competent secretaries of state, notably for constituting crews of workmen."

Employers are forbidden to hire any workers except those provided by the government labor service, and are enjoined from discharging any employes without government authorization.

Promulgation of the decree follows a government campaign to recruit skilled workmen to be sent to Germany in exchange for the release of French war prisoners in a ratio of three workers for one prisoner.

have been stalled in their attempted advance on Port Moresby, but the situation "remains unchanged."

In the air war against shipping, one allied bomb blew the stern off a Japanese vessel near Seloe island in the Tanimbar island group between Australia and New Guinea and she was left in a sinking condition, the communique said.

Another ship was attacked with machinegun fire in the same raid and farther north, off the Kai Islands, still another Japanese ship was bombed with unknown result.

Flying Fortresses found a Japanese cruiser and destroyer southeast of New Britain on the eastern side of New Guinea and despite poor weather conditions and intense anti-aircraft fire attacked the cruiser. Results could not be seen, it was announced. All the Fortresses returned safely.

## Largest Cattle Run Since '34 Swamps Market

KANSAS CITY, Sept. 14 (AP)—The largest cattle run since the 1934 drought days swamped the livestock market here today with beef steers on the hoof.

The estimated salable receipts of cattle today was 32,000, nearly 500 more than the previous big day of the season last Aug. 31.

Last week's rise of 25 to 50 cents in prices of stockers and feeders was reduced in a slow trade as combest buyers bought cautiously, probably reflecting fear of a cattle price ceiling. About 70 per cent of the receipts were stockers and feeders.

pending upon anti-aircraft batteries and volleys from infantrymen who often turn their rifles upon dive-bombers.

This is considered here as one of the war's most ominous developments and is being watched closely by American officers here in the interest of getting more planes to the soviet union.

### News Lacking

In the central Caucasus, the Russians said their forces in the Nozdok sector had halted the German drive toward the Grozny oil fields but that the nazis were bringing up strong reinforcements and that a new assault was expected momentarily.

News was lacking on action along the Black Sea coast south of fallen Novorossisk where the Germans were believed feeling out Russian strength in preparation for thrust down the coastal road leading to the oil port of Batum.

At the northern end of the front the red army offensive continued in the Volkhov sector toward the rail town of Sinyavino. This fighting was taking place in heavily fortified zones where the nazis have been entrenched for almost a year.

The red army was fighting hand-to-hand over a broad area west and southwest of Stalingrad, Pravda said in a front dispatch.

German air units which went up to bomb the Russians were forced to turn back without carrying out their mission when it became obvious that bombing of the massive close-quarter struggle below would destroy Germans as well as Russians, it was reported.

## Anti-Inflation Bill Would Give FDR Broad Power

McNary told reporters he considered the objectives commendable but that some "modifications in the interest of inflation control" might have to be made. He did not elaborate.

Brown explained that the bill "does not require that prices for agricultural commodities go to parity," but that commodities now below parity would be subject to "natural economic conditions."

The bill provides that the price ceiling shall not be fixed below the higher of these two alternatives:

1. The parity price of "a comparable price" where one has been determined, or
2. The highest market price between Jan. 1 and Sept. 15, 1942.

The president could suspend section three of the price control act which prohibits the fixing of a ceiling on agricultural prices until they reach 100 per cent of parity.

### SHIP SUNK

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14 (AP)—The navy announced today that a medium-sized merchant vessel of Panamanian registry was torpedoed and sunk by an enemy submarine late in August in the Atlantic several hundred miles off the north coast of South America. Survivors have been landed at an east coast United States port.
