RELIEF SEEN FOR SHORTAGE OF FUEL HERE

The fuel shortage which has existed in Klamath Falls for the past year promises to be materially relieved by an order signed Saturday by Richard G. Montgomery, OPA director for Oregon, and affecting three local fuel dealers.

Effective as of September 14, the order authorizes a uniform increase of 75 cents a load in the price of slab wood, making accessible an estimated 800 cords a month from remote sources not normally available to this city.

Study Made
Dealers affected were Peyton and company, Fred H. Heilbronner and the Frankford Fuel company, who said that the increase authorized would apply to wood on hand as well as to the new supply.

The agreement was said to be the outcome of a thorough study of the situation by Dr. Blair Stewart, head of the fuel price division of OPA in Oregon. Dealers said they did not expect the order would give complete relief to the shortage, which was caused by migration of large numbers of wood cutters to higher paid jobs and by the fact that mills are marketing low grade lumber once discarded as waste. Nevertheless, they said, it would go a long way toward solving the problem.

The speed with which the OPA office in Portland cut through red tape and acted upon the application for an adjustment of price ceilings to alleviate the local fuel shortage was impressive, dealers said. The application was submitted on Friday, September 11, they pointed out, and the order was issued on Saturday, effective as of Monday.

BERTRAM NAMED TO JEWELERS' OFFICE

PORTLAND, Sept. 14 (AP)—Oregon jewelers appealed yesterday for government aid, which they said was needed to keep them in business.

Members of the annual Oregon State Jewelers' association convention said WPB orders had cut their use of foreign silver to one-sixth of what it was in the first six months of this year.

They said the price of domestic silver was prohibitive. Congress was asked to make silver available at a reasonable price.

PRISON TRUSTIES RETURN TO JAIL

SALEM, Sept. 14 (AP)—Two state prison trustees who escaped last Thursday night from Westfir in Lane county, prison officials said today.

The men, Cornelius L. Long, 32, sentenced from Lane county to serve 10 years for attempted rape, and Fred E. McCoy, 31, sentenced from Jackson county to serve 10 years for assault and robbery, went to Long's father's home at Westfir yesterday and said they wanted to give themselves up. Long's father then called Warden George Alexander, who was in the Eugene area conducting the search.

Alexander said the men were driving a car they stole in Salem the day they escaped.

EXPLOSIONS ROCK BIG STREAMLINER

CRESTON, Ia., Sept. 14 (AP)—Twelve explosions rocked the westbound 12-car Burlington Zephyr streamliner train two and a half miles east of Nodaway, Ia., at 12:20 a. m. today. Burlington officials said passengers escaped injury and damage to the train was slight.

There were about 180 passengers aboard the crack streamliner, which was travelling approximately 70 miles an hour when the explosions occurred, officials here said.

Many of the passengers, asleep at the time, were unaware of the explosions.

The FBI at Des Moines is investigating the cause of the explosions, but James L. Dalton, head of the FBI bureau in Iowa, said the cause was not determined.

Nine of the cars suffered damage. The train did not leave the track.

Yank Pilots Get Inferior Planes, Says Sen. Truman

in building American fighters up "to the best standards of Great Britain." He praised American bombers and other aircraft but said the plane building program "discriminated against fighters."

"Scarcely a week goes by now without some prominent flier returning to this country and asking why we can't give the boys better pursuit planes," Truman declared.

He said that while the question of a unified command, relating to matters of strategy, was one with which his committee hesitated to deal, its absence had contributed to the disaster at Pearl Harbor, that congress subsequently had been assured that unity of command had been achieved, but that the subcommittee's report on Alaska indicated it needed more attention.

In a seven-page address, Truman asserted that "wasteful and extravagant" construction practices had not been eliminated under the army engineers corps and it was insufficient for those in charge to "render lip service" to the principles of economy enunciated by the committee.

Although commending Chairman Donald M. Nelson of the war production board, Truman declared that Nelson still was encountering "obstruction" from government agencies and the armed forces.
