Virgil Stewart Helps In "State Night" Plans

SHEPARD FIELD, Tex., Sept. 14 (Special)—The committee in charge of the Shepard Field, Tex., "State of Oregon Night," scheduled for October 3, has received the first Oregonian greeting for the occasion from Secretary of State Snell, and the first gift in the form of two cases of fancy Oregon crab meat from the Columbia River Packers association in Astoria. "It is a genuine pleasure and an honored privilege," wrote Snell. "To send greetings on this occasion of 'Oregon Night' at Shepard field, Oregon is proud of its men in the service of the United States. The state has always been in the forefront in all types of service to the country and in all patriotic endeavors—in every war in which this country has participated since Oregon became a state."

The "State of Oregon Night" is being handled by a committee of soldiers from Oregon, with the cooperation and help of the local USO club in nearby Wichita Falls. Music, singing, dancing, refreshments, entertainment, and a display of genuine Oregon spirit will feature the program for the evening. Private Virgil Stewart, Klamath Falls member of the committee, expressed the hope that "Earl Snell's greeting would be the first of hundreds of greetings to be sent to us by Oregonians." ADDITIONAL RENT CEILINGS DECREED

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16 (AP)—Acting to curb what it called "inflated rents," the office of price administration today ordered 54 more defense-rental areas brought under federal rent control October 1.

All rentals for living quarters were frozen at the levels of March 1, 1942, except in Choctaw, Okla., where the freeze date was October 1, 1941.

Extending from Newport, R. I., to Walla Walla, Wash., the 54 areas have an aggregate population of about 4,500,000. OPA earlier had brought 130 areas, with a population of 45,500,000, under federal rent control.

The OPA listed new defense rental areas, extent of each area, and the population of the area, respectively, including:

Oregon—Bedford—Jackson county, 36,213; Pendleton—Umatilla county, 26,030.
