

DAVIS FLAYS PETRILLO BAN ON RECORDS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17 (AP)—Elmer Davis, director of the office of war information, told a congressional committee today that James C. Petrillo's ban against musical records and transcriptions threatened the war-time national system of communication.

Davis was the first witness before a senate interstate commerce subcommittee hearing called to determine the effect on public morale of the order by Petrillo, the president of the American Federation of Musicians, forbidding union musicians to make records and transcriptions for radio stations and coin-operated phonographs.

Obstructs Effort
This order, Davis testified, had the effect of halting the making of records necessary to the keeping of audiences by upwards of 150 radio stations.

"A policy which threatens the continued existence of many of these stations is injurious to the national system of communication, and may seriously hamper the work for which this office of war information was established, of informing the people about the status and progress of the war effort and the war policies, activities and aims of this government."

Preliminary
Petrillo has contended that the use of "canned music" meant loss of employment for musicians.

Chairman Clark (D-Iowa) adjourned the brief hearing until tomorrow when he said Chairman James L. Fly of the federal communications commission would testify.

The hearing was described by Clark as a preliminary to a request for a "full-fledged" investigation of Petrillo's activities.

FARM BUREAU BACKS OVER-ALL CONTROL

PENDLETON, Sept. 17 (AP)—Price control of all groups has been consistently advocated by the farm bureau, R. W. Blackburn, Chicago, secretary of the national organization, told the Umatilla county bureau last night.

"It has been said often enough," Blackburn declared, "that wages must be stabilized but at the same time the administration has been against imposing ceilings on wages." National leaders "have proclaimed the doctrine that prices of industrial goods and farm commodities must be held down."

The farm bureau will continue to fight for the agricultural parity concept he said, at the same time it supports price controls for all groups.

A scheduled meeting of the state farm bureau executive board was cancelled by inability of several members to attend.

More Women Must Take Industrial Jobs, Says Officer

PORTLAND, Sept. 17 (AP)—More women must take jobs in industry to replace men, Col. K. B. Harmon, chief of the San Francisco army ordnance division, said yesterday while touring northwest war industries.

The army "must have the men and we'll get them—married men with children and all," he said.

Women can fill men's places in industry because they "excel men everywhere they come in competition with them. The dexterity of women workers makes them priceless on assembly line jobs," he concluded.
