PREDATORY ANIMAL CONTROL MAPPED

Directors of the Klamath Wool Growers association met Thursday and worked out plans to maintain and improve predatory animal control work in Klamath county. Four districts were established, and directors in these districts were made responsible for aggressive predatory animal control work.

Growers were requested to subscribe funds in cooperation with state and federal funds for this purpose. In certain areas, loss due to coyotes has been a heavy burden on sheep operators and many other livestock producers, and in the present period of heavy meat needs, such losses are serious, it was stated.

Under the new arrangement, each association director in the county will assume full responsibility for improved predatory animal control in his respective district.

Germany, is the No. 1 enemy of the United States.

HE goes on: "The Japs are already in the Aleutians. I mention it merely as a concrete indication of what Japan hopes to do, intends to do and WILL DO IF SHE CAN—first bomb important American centers and then, eventually, INVADE AMERICA."

HE then adds that the Japs say themselves that their tactics are frequently based on an attack through a particular area "after their enemies have been lulled into a false sense of security and COMPLACENCY."

That is of peculiar and particular interest to us here. Remember their SEEMINGLY SILLY tactics on this coast so far—their almost childish shelling of the Santa Barbara oil field, their similarly childish shelling at Seaside and their exhibitionist fire bombing over at Brookings last week.

THIS writer remarked the other day that their exploits on this coast so far have been so obviously absurd on their face as to suggest that there must be some DEADLY PATTERN back of them and that this deadly pattern may be to mislead us into the complacent belief that the Japs are just simple-minded children who can be turned over our knee and paddled whenever the time comes—and therefore needn't be feared or very carefully prepared against.

Ambassador Grew tells us today that creating just such an impression is one of their definite, tactical practices. **SO this writer would like to repeat** the advice given the other day: **DON'T UNDERESTIMATE THE JAP.** Not even though the official communiques that are supposedly intended to keep us informed as to the progress of the Pacific war almost invariably sound the optimistic note that "the Marines have landed and the situation is well in hand."

It is this writer's belief that the Jap is an enemy who can't be trifled with.
