DAR Hears Program

Dr. Lamb Speaks to Eulalona Chapter Members Monday

Dr. E. D. Lamb was the guest speaker at the regular meeting of Eulalona chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, held Monday evening, at the home of Mrs. Elmer H. Balsiger. Mrs. O. C. Timmons and Mrs. Helen Mueller were the assisting hostesses. Mrs. Z. W. Dixon, chapter regent, presided.

Dr. Lamb's subject was "Blood Plasma and Its Use During the War." He traced the history of blood transfusion down through the centuries since the 1700s when it was first introduced. However, according to Dr. Lamb, it was only since 1907 that really successful transfusions have been made, and the rules governing blood donations are strict. No one under 120 pounds in weight, or over sixty-two years of age, is considered suitable for blood donations. He brought out the fact that only about two hundred persons in this section have had their blood typed, and that this would not be sufficient in an emergency. An informal discussion followed.
