REVENUE BILL AMENDED TO LIMIT TAXES

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21 (AP)—The senate finance committee amended the new revenue bill today to place a limitation on the amount of federal income and victory taxes which could be collected from any individual at 90 per cent of his next taxable income.

Committee attaches said this would affect only persons with taxable incomes of approximately \$1,000,000 annually, since the combined rate of both taxes would not exceed 90 per cent for those in lower brackets.

Perjury Statutes
Because approximately 43,000,000 persons will be required to file federal tax returns under the new bill, the committee acted at the treasury's suggestion to eliminate a provision requiring taxpayers to have their returns notarized.

Collin F. Stam, head of the congressional tax staff, said that perjury statutes would cover persons who made false returns, even though the returns were not sworn.

Cleaning up odds and ends in preparation to a session tomorrow to consider revision of the present laws governing the renegotiation of war contracts, the committee adopted several minor amendments.

MARINE CORPS TO SIGN UP STUDENTS

The United States marine corps is today sending out officer procurement boards to visit every college and university in the country to sign up members of the freshman, sophomore, junior and senior classes as private first class in the marine corps reserve, for future training as officers in the candidates class.

The men who sign up are not eligible for the draft, and it is the intention of the marine corps to allow these men to finish their college studies and obtain their degrees. If any national emergency should arise which would mean that any of these men were needed before completion of their college work, the marine corps will still accept these men for candidates class training.

The candidates class is a 10-week course in which the men are taught the rudiments of military science and the duties of a platoon commander in the field. The men who successfully complete this course are commissioned second lieutenants in the marine corps reserve and are then sent to a three months' reserve officers school for further advanced training before being assigned to a combat unit or to another school for specialized training.

OUR MEN IN SERVICE
IN SOUTH PACIFIC—Pvt. William H. Sullivan of the Marine corps, son of H. J. Sullivan of Summers lane, has been in the south Pacific war area for the past seven months as a radio operator in headquarters.

He has not been heard from in more than two months and is believed to be in the Solomon Islands with the Leathernecks who stormed and occupied three of the islands last month.
