Portland Busters Wallop Vancouver, 35-0; Spokane Nudges Seattle, 7-6

The Northwest War Industries Football league got off to a flying start yesterday as the Portland Busters defeated the Vancouver Warcoas, 35-0, and Spokane defeated Seattle, 7-6.

The Spokane fracas produced no scoring until the final 93 seconds of play when the airtight defenses of both teams let up for just long enough to produce a spine-tingling finale.

The Seattle squad went 75 yards on two passes by former Oregonian Inky Boe to Del Owens for a tally but failed to convert when the try-out kick was blocked.

At Portland, the heavy and crafty Oregon squad virtually swamped Vancouver with three tallies in the first quarter and then added a fourth in the second after being forced back momentarily by a passing attack of the Warcoas. Shortly before the half ended the Busters intercepted a pass on the one-yard stripe to stop Vancouver's only scoring threat.

The last half was quiet, with Portland scoring only once when it drove 71 yards in the final period.

Both games were well attended.

The struggle for the National league pennant has now been reduced to the point where St. Louis can clinch it with any combination of five victories of their own or five defeats for the Brooklyn Dodgers.

Since the Cardinals have six games left to play, that means they can lose one of them and still win even though the Dodgers capture all seven of their remaining tussles.

The best Brooklyn could do against the futile Phils yesterday was halve a doubleheader and all that saved them from winding up even deeper in the rut than their present 24 games was a truly great pitching performance by Claude Passeau.

The ace of the Chicago Cubs pitched a five-hit 3-0 shutout against the Cards in the second game of a doubleheader for his 19th victory after the Cardinals' Morton Cooper had given the Cubs a four-hit 1-0 whitewashing.

Cooper's feat came in an airtight duel with his former teammate, Lon Warneke, who scattered seven safeties but was defeated on a double steal which brought Johnny Hopp home in the fourth inning. This was the 100th triumph for the Cardinals and Cooper's 21st.

Brooklyn was beaten in the first game 7-3 and the defeat was all the more humiliating because Whitlow Wyatt, the Dodgers' No. 1 star, was knocked out in less than four innings when Danny Litwhiler and Nick Etten hit home runs, the latter with two aboard. Credit for the victory went to Tommy Hughes.

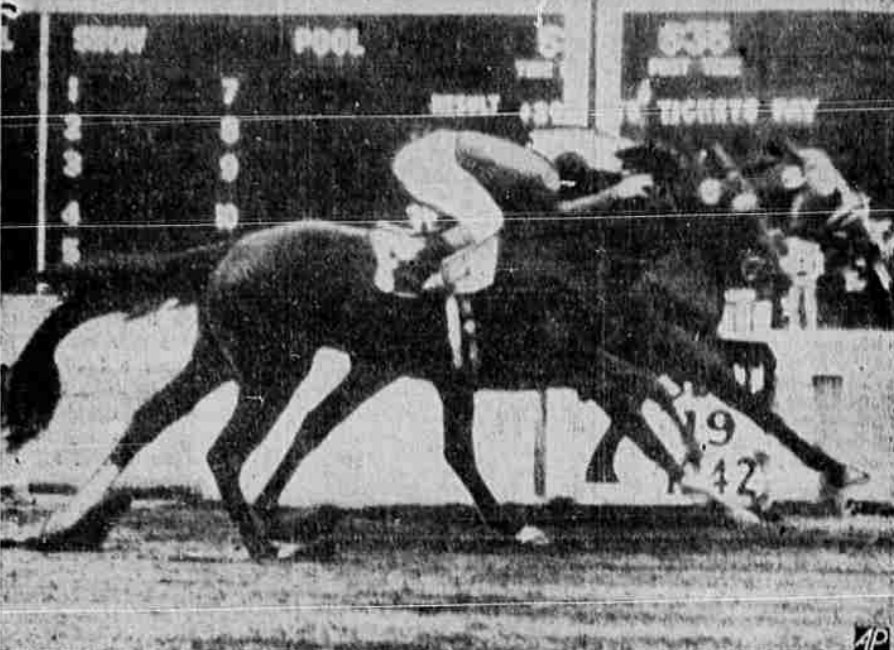
Buck Newsom, self-styled pennant insurance for the Dodgers, pitched six-hit ball to win the nightcap 4-2 and kept Brooklyn's pennant hopes from dying.

Today Brooklyn has another date with the Phils at Ebbets field and the Cardinals returned home for the first of two encounters with the Pittsburgh Pirates by three games.

Like the headline engagements, all the other Major league action yesterday involved doubleheaders and all were divided except Cincinnati's clash with the Pirates. They battled 13 innings in the first before the Pirates won 2-1 and then played a 3-3 tie in the second, which was halted at seven innings by Pennsylvania's Sunday curfew.

The New York Giants' games at Boston were postponed.
