Don't risk spoilage this year in your Home Canning

Read and remember these precautionary suggestions that come from the Saffeway Homemakers' Bureau. They will help protect your canned fruits and jellies from mold—help protect your canned meats, vegetables, fish and poultry from dangerous bacterial spoilage.

To avoid the danger of spoilage that botulinus bacteria brings, pressure cooking is the only really safe method of processing meat, fish, poultry, and all vegetables except tomatoes. The pressure cooker maintains the above-boiling temperature required for thorough sterilization.

Tomatoes and fruits, because they are acid, don't favor growth of botulinus bacteria, so you may can fruits and tomatoes by any reliable method that's convenient.



Sterilization of jars, lids, and rubbers is always important. Examine them before you begin, and discard any that are nicked and cracked, because such defects prevent a perfect seal. For the same reason, be sure jars and lids fit together tightly.

Wash jars (and old lids, if re-usable) in hot soap suds; rinse well; cover with warm water in a large kettle or dish pan, and boil 15 minutes to sterilize. A clean dish towel on the bottom of the pan guards against breakage. Let jars stand in hot water until they're ready to use.

Sterilize new tops or lids by placing in pan and covering with boiling water. Always use new rubbers, and dip in boiling water to sterilize before using. There are several kinds of fruit jars and lids, so be sure you thoroughly understand the kind you use. Because sealing methods differ.



No matter what method of canning you use—(open kettle, hot or cold pack), no matter what means of processing (water bath, steam cooker or pressure cooker)—be sure to carry out the specific directions that fit the method you are using.

Ordinarily the hot pack or pre-cook canning method is considered best. Bring the food to be canned to the boiling point; pack into hot sterilized jars and process.

In the square of a little village not far from here I came on the prettiest flower garden you ever saw.

It was a lot of flowers all mixed up—hundreds of different kinds, I guess. So I asked a passerby if he could tell me about it.

"Well," he says, "in this town whenever anybody plants a flower garden and has any seeds left, they scatter them over this plot."

Then he leans over and pulls out a couple of weeds. "We all have to help pull out the weeds too," he tells me. "That way the village has a flower garden to be proud of."

That's about as pretty an illustration of co-operation as I ever come across. But there's plenty of examples of co-operation and civic spirit these days.

We were talking just yesterday about how the brewers and the beer distributors are working together and co-operating with law enforcement authorities.

You see a lot of friendship and fine old customs have grown up

around beer. But the weeds—well—they've got to be pulled out, too.

Everybody has to lend a hand. And the brewing industry is just sensible enough to recognize that... But what's more—they're doing something about it.

The brewers don't want their beer sold in the wrong kind of places, and so they've teamed up with the authorities in a self-regulation program to make careless beer retailers "clean up or close up," as they say.

From what I read, the plan is working out mighty successful in a number of states, and is spreading out into others.

From where I sit, it looks like a fine idea... a mighty practical example of how honest co-operation works out to the benefit of everyone—the brewers, the beer retailers, and we plain citizens that like our gardens and our pleasures—with the weeds kept out.
