

JUNKMAN HAS VITAL ROLE IN SCRAP DRIVE

NEW YORK, Sept. 23 (AP)—Wait a minute before you get sore at the junkman for not coming around for your 25 pounds of scrap or not giving you the price you thought it was worth.

Maybe the sight of scrap piled high in his yard discouraged you from realizing fully that there was a real and serious shortage.

Maybe the junkman would have good answers to your wondering. If you don't know the answers or don't understand them and therefore stop collecting scrap, the war job suffers.

Mills Lack Scrap
Because the junkman is doing important work in the war, the government is taking the trouble to set public thinking straight about the role he's playing.

More than ever he'll be valuable in the next three weeks as American newspapers spearhead scrap collections for the mills which are producing five million tons less steel than they should because of scrap lack.

More than 1400 newspapers are in the drive which officially runs from September 23 to October 17, but in some states already is under way.

Dump Your Scrap
The war production board warned this week that unless there is an "exceptional job" of iron and steel scrap collection this fall the country's blast furnaces would have to cut down steel output this winter.

You may dump your scrap—anything from old lawnmowers to iron pots—in the town square's collection bin, but eventually it will move to the mills through the junkman who buys it.

On the subject of junkman's prices, the Institute of Scrap Iron and Steel says: "Figuring his various expenses, the junkman can't afford to pay more than \$9 a ton for the best scrap."

The price the mills pay him varies from \$13 to \$20 a ton, depending on the location. It costs him from 55 cents to \$5 a ton to move it to the mills. It costs him from \$3.50 to \$4.50 a ton to prepare it before it moves.

DRAFT FACES COAL MINERS FOR DAYS OFF

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23 (AP)—Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, selective service director, said today coal miners and other workers deferred from military service because of their occupations but who take frequent days off for unexplained reasons will risk being drafted in the future.

Spokesmen for the coal industry in particular have made urgent appeals to workers to cut out voluntary absenteeism which has made serious inroads into production.

May Be Re-classified
Hershey told reporters in response to questions that a new regulation would apply to the coal miners, although it was not prompted solely by the recent pleas of that industry.

The regulation provides that when a deferred registrant or group of registrants "is not supporting or is adversely affecting the war effort or the national health, safety, or interest," the offender, or offenders may be called up for re-classification by local draft boards.

Hershey said the order reflected a fundamental principle of selective service that deferment is granted because the registrant is more vital in his occupation than in the armed forces. When he ceases to perform such vital work, he no longer should be deferred, the selective service chief asserted.

AUTO INSURANCE RULES EXTENDED

SALEM, Sept. 23 (AP)—Automobile liability insurance will not be voided in cases where motorists participate in share-the-rides campaigns, State Insurance Commissioner Seth B. Thompson said today in a letter

to Floyd J. Cook, secretary of the state highway traffic advisory committee.

Many motorists working in defense industries are giving rides to other workers, who share expenses. Virtually all liability insurance policies exclude such practices.

Thompson said, however, that every automobile insurance company operating in Oregon had agreed to permit such practices without voiding the policies.

"The action taken by the insurance companies," Thompson said, "does not permit private automobile owners to use their cars in public or livery conveyances, but is designed to enable participation in bona-fide ride-sharing plans without impairment of the automobile liability policy."

TAVERN QUARREL FATAL TO YOUTH

SEATTLE, Sept. 23 (AP)—A quarrel in a South Seattle tavern last night ended with the fatal shooting of John A. McCauley, 20, and serious injury to his brother, Edmund McCauley, 25, who was shot in the face.

Ernest Hale, 59, a bartender in the place, is held by police for questioning in connection with the shooting.

Coroner Otto H. Mittelstadt said Corporal Louis R. Fortier told him he heard Hale warn the McCauleys not to come closer and then saw him start shooting as the brothers continued to advance on the bartender.

John McCauley was struck by three bullets, one of which pierced his heart, and his brother received a compound fracture of the jaw from a fourth shot. His condition was described as fair by hospital attendants.
