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of streets in the northwest suburbs of Stalingrad.

The broadcast, quoting Berlin advices, said the Russians had launched a drive "in fairly considerable force" in that sector.

Volga river gunboats laid down a flaming barrage on German shock troops within the battered city, supporting red army artillerymen, machine-gunners and riflemen in mowing down the invaders by the thousands.

Planes Pound City

Dispatches to Red Star said the Germans sent 200 tanks ruffling through the debris-littered streets as a shield for a single attack, but declared that soviet defenders beat off the thrust.

The paper said the battle was now raging with unprecedented savagery, with the Russians doggedly clinging to their defenses in barricaded streets and smoking ruins under shot, shell and bomb.

German warplanes were pounding the city and Volga river traffic in continuous raids, Red Star said. A barge withdrawing refugees was reported smashed.

That's the real American way to do it.

Let's do it that way.

Surgical Dressing Project Planned

A surgical dressing project is to be started in Klamath Falls immediately as a federal government program under the auspices of the Red Cross. Klamath Falls is one of 40 west coast towns selected for the project, and each town is expected to produce 20,000 dressings a month for war use.

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'COLLISION' WITH FDR SEEN ON PRICE BILL

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carried out his you-do-it-or-I-will request to congress on September 7 that it act before October 1 to cut back the level at which farm prices could be controlled.

Brown's statement was made to the senate after these swiftly moving developments:

Developments

1. Administration leaders agreed to offer a compromise which would direct President Roosevelt to lift farm price ceilings where they failed to reflect the increased cost of farm labor and other items.

2. This compromise was quickly and unanimously rejected by 13 senate agriculture committee members, who voted to stand by a proposal to alter the parity base itself.

3. Democratic Leader Barkley, of Kentucky, indicated no further efforts to compromise would be made and the issue would be fought out on the senate floor.

Brown did not enlarge on his reference to the third branch of government and left to others the inference that the president's orders might be challenged in court.

Brown alluded to the demand of the congressional farm bloc that farm parity prices be revised upward to take into account cost of all labor on the farms, a revision to which President Roosevelt said he was "unalterably opposed."

Some administration supporters have said that if this provision, already approved by the house in passing the anti-inflation legislation, were finally adopted by congress, the president might veto the bill and proceed to act under executive authority.

Senator Thomas (D-Okla.) said

all members present at a meeting with leaders of farm organizations had agreed to stand by an amendment sponsored by him and Senator Hatch (D-N.M.), which would increase the level of parity prices by about 12 percent by including all farm labor costs as a factor.

The house adopted a similar amendment yesterday in passing a measure authorizing and directing President Roosevelt to stabilize prices, wages and salaries at September 15 levels, so far as practical.
