

COLONISTS AT NEWELL SIGN FOR FARM WORK

NEWELL, Calif. — Following the proclamation of September 1, in which people of Japanese ancestry were asked to sign up for work in the beet fields and the harvesting of crops, 468 colonists at Tule lake relocation center have already gone to work in the beet fields of Utah, Montana, Oregon and Idaho.

Almost 400 others have indicated their willingness to leave the project for similar work, and arrangements are being made as fast as possible to supply western agricultural farmers with adequate and efficient workmen.

Under Contract

The majority of workers are young men, many of whom are experienced farmers. They leave the project under contract and will return to the project at the termination of their work, although those who sign up for permanent employment under the provisions laid down by the WRA will be allowed to remain on the "outside."

Distribution of the workers follows: September 11, 50 men, Weber and Davis counties, Utah, Amalgamated Sugar company; September 14, 48 men, Gem county, Idaho, Amalgamated; evening of the same day, 52 men, Ravalli county, Mont., American Crystal Sugar company, September 16, 48 men, Malheur county, Ore., Amalgamated; September 17, 43 men, Missoula county, Mont., American Crystal Sugar company; September 18, 42 men, Gem and Payette counties, Ida., Amalgamated; evening of the same day, 49 men, Townsend, Montana, American Crystal; September 20, 45 men, Enmette, Parma, Caldwell, Marsing and Payette, Ida., Amalgamated.

Babies born at the Tule lake relocation center reached the half-hundred mark on Saturday when a boy was born to Mr. and Mrs. Koyama. Of these, 27 are boys and 23 are girls. However, four of the male babies died soon after birth.

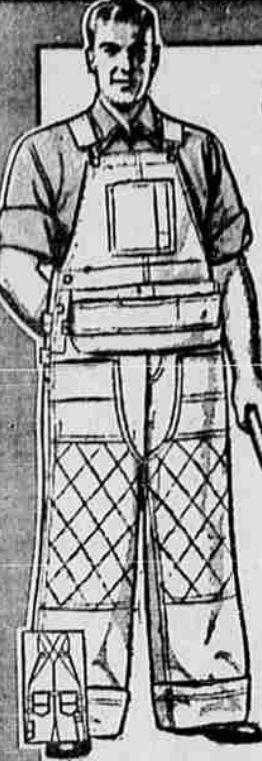

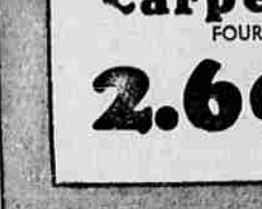

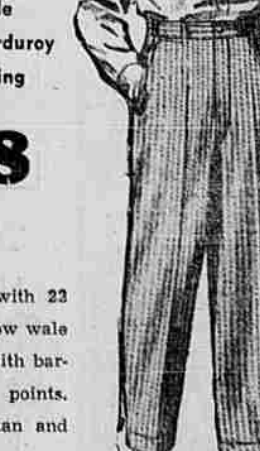
