

CHANGES IN AAA PURCHASE OF SEED TOLD

Expected changes in the 1943 AAA seed purchase program were announced yesterday by the local AAA office.

Increased production of hairy vetch and annual ryegrass is wanted and the commodity credit corporation will offer guaranteed prices for an unlimited amount of these seeds. Prices will remain the same as this year's schedule—10 cents a pound for top-grade hairy vetch and five cents a pound for top-grade ryegrass.

For Austrian winter peas and Willamette vetch, no expansion is desired above this year's record acreage. Price support programs will be continued for the production from an acreage substantially the same as the 1942 acreage. Prices offered by commodity credit corporation will remain unchanged—61 cents for Willamette vetch, 5 cents for Austrian winter peas.

No price support program has been announced for Hungarian and common vetch or crimson clover.

Seed Shipped
Production of these cover crops seeds constitute one of Oregon's most important contributions to the Food for Freedom program.

Seed acquired by the government is shipped to the southern states, where it is distributed to growers under the conservation materials program to combat soil erosion and depletion. This year, with available nitrate supplies needed to make munitions, league cover crops are even more important as a means of supplying nitrogen to the soil on Dike land farms.

The adjustments for 1943 represent changes in need, brought about largely by war conditions, and do not reflect any failure on the part of Oregon growers to produce the needed amounts of seed.

Legislation to Keep Labor On Farms Eyed by Group

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24 (AP)

Apparently convinced that government officials intend to do nothing now about a farm labor shortage, members of the house agriculture committee today were reported on the verge of drafting legislation to deal with the problem.

Before taking any such action, though, Chairman Fulmer (D-

S. C.) said the committee would seek the opinion tomorrow of Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, selective service director, and possibly later that of Paul V. McNutt, war manpower commission head.

"It may be that General Hershey will have some recommendations," Fulmer said. "At any rate, we want to hear his views and try to get an idea of the manpower needs for the armed forces."

After hearing Secretary of Agriculture Wickard warn that failure to relieve the farm labor shortage would make it necessary "in the not too distant future to deal with a shortage of food," Fulmer told reporters:

"The secretary offered us no real solution to the problem which he admitted was grave. It is beginning to look like government officials will not do anything about it until an actual food shortage stares them right in the face. It might be too late then."

Rather than wait until then, Fulmer added, committee members believe they should take "an aggressive attitude" and seek to solve the problem themselves.

What form any proposed legislation would take was highly uncertain. Fulmer himself has advocated payment of higher prices to farmers for their products to enable them to compete in the labor market with war factories. Some form of government subsidy might be necessary to bring this about, he conceded.

BOYS INVESTIGATED FOR PETTY THEFTS

Five boys, all between the ages of nine and 11, are being investigated by Dave Bridge, city juvenile officer, in connection with a series of petty thefts from several local business firms.

Two of the boys have already confessed and restored the articles taken to the owners, and the others will be asked to do the same or make compensation for them. Parents of the children are said to be cooperating with Bridge in seeing that they receive proper punishment.

Taken at various times by the boys were such articles as candy and gum, cap pistols and holsters, flashlights and bandanas, jackknives and batteries, indicating that they have been beset with "wild west" ideas.

Business firms from which articles were missed were F. W. Woolworth company, Safeway stores, Walgreen Drug company, Everbody's Drug store and Louie Polin Sporting Goods store.

Agricultural Conservation Rates Lowered

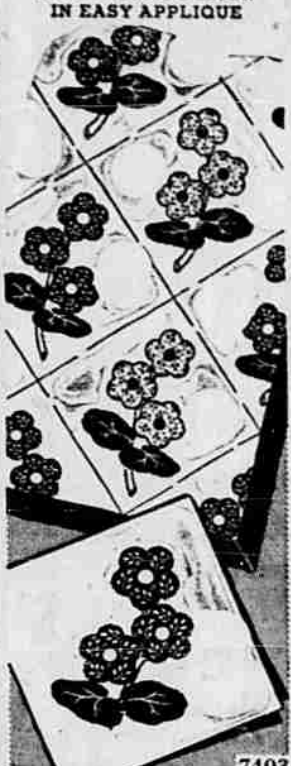
An exceptionally low rate is to be paid by Agricultural Conservation association members in 1942 for administrative expenses, according to an announcement from county AAA offices.

The rate of deduction to be taken from payments is only 4.8 per cent. Klamath county has never used the 10 per cent allowed for this purpose, it was said, and the 4.8 per cent is considered outstanding for a county of this size.

CONSUMPTION OF MEAT TO BE RESTRICTED

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24 (AP)

Secretary of Agriculture Wickard announced today that, beginning October 1, civilian meat consumption during the last three months of this year would be restricted to approximately 79 per cent of the amount delivered by packers for civilian use during the last quarter of 1941.

Simultaneously, Wickard reiterated that citizens voluntarily should limit themselves to 21 pounds of meat a week per person, to permit a fair sharing of available supplies.

Deliveries Curtailed

As chairman of the war production board's food requirements committee, Wickard disclosed that, to assure sufficient meat for army, navy, and lend-lease needs, the committee had ordered deliveries for civilian use curtailed on this basis:

Beef and veal, 80 per cent of deliveries during the last quarter of 1941; lamb and mutton, 95 per cent; pork, 75 per cent.

The allowance proposed, the secretary declared, was entirely adequate for good nutrition, assuming the 21 pound limit was observed.

Voluntary Ration

"It is necessary that individuals hold their consumption at this figure whether they eat at home or in public eating places," Wickard said. "Public eating places in some sections may prefer some such device as a meatless day."

"We plan to consult with the trade groups of people managing public eating places and help them work out methods of enabling their patrons to stay within the sharing limits."

Individual households may use any method the family prefers in effecting the limitation, he explained. However, if there are invalids, aged persons, young children, or vegetarians in the home—none of whom would normally consume 21 pounds of meat a week—the housewife should reduce her purchases accordingly, Wickard declared.

Wage Problems Of Lumber To Be Discussed

SEATTLE, Sept. 24 (AP)—The first of 17 hearings to discuss the wage problems of the lumber industry scheduled for cities in the west will be opened here October 12 by the war labor board's new lumber industry commission for the western states.

A five-man commission with full powers to adjust wages and consisting of two representatives of industry, two of organized labor and one of the public will conduct the hearing. Thomas F. Neblett, the board's chief mediator, announced last night.

EXTRADITION OF SPENCER ASKED

SACRAMENTO, Sept. 24 (AP)

The governor's office today issued an extradition application for the return of D. H. Spencer, also known as Douglas or Dudley Spencer from Klamath Falls, Ore., to San Francisco to answer a grand jury indictment charging him with lewd conduct and contributing to the delinquency of a 12-year-old girl at a San Francisco hotel.

The complaint states that Spencer is the proprietor of children's apparel stores in Klamath Falls and Portland and that his unlawful act, a felony, occurred September 10, 1942.

Edwin E. Driscoll, attorney for Dudley H. Spencer, said today that the accused man would not fight extradition.

He said that Inspector James Tompkins of the San Francisco juvenile detail is expected in the city Friday to take Spencer back to face the grand jury indictment.
