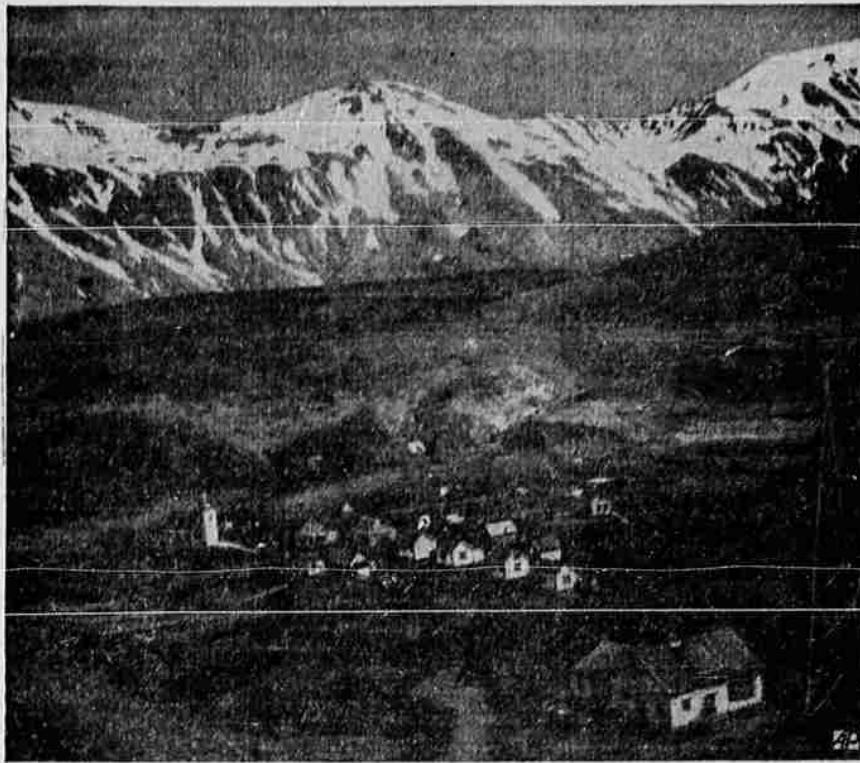
FINGERPRINTING OF CHILDREN PLANNED

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TACOMA FIRE LOSS REACHES \$50,000

TACOMA, Sept. 24 (AP)—A spectacular fire which brought all off-duty firemen in the city to their posts caused nearly \$50,000 damages to three industrial plants and completely destroyed the Fick foundry, machine and pattern plant on the Tacoma tidflats.

The blaze, which roared skyward for more than two hours, endangered six huge tanks of stored gasoline but firemen were able to bring it under control before the fuel was ignited. Fire Chief Emory Whitaker estimated damage to the foundry plant alone would amount to more than \$30,000.

Ten companies of the fire department were placed in service and constant streams of water were played on the tanks of the Richfield Oil company, located only a short distance away. Chief Whitaker ordered the entire force, including off-duty men, to stand by in case the gasoline exploded.
