Paul Seeley Lectures Here on Christian Science

On Tuesday evening, at KUH's auditorium, a lecture on "Christian Science: The Discovery of Life Eternal" was delivered by Paul Stark Seeley, C.S.B., of Portland, a member of the board of lecturership of the Mother Church, the First Church of Christ, Scientist, of Boston.

The lecturer, who was introduced by Mrs. Marion R. Hiatt, said in part: "Jesus healed all manner of disease and sin by his clear understanding of man's sonship with God, his spiritual nature, and the superiority this gives him over all the claims of destructive material forces. A favorite statement of Science and Health is (pp. 476, 477): 'Jesus beheld in Science the perfect man, who appeared to him when sinning mortal man appears to mortals. In this perfect man the Saviour saw God's own likeness, and this correct view of man healed the sick.' Christian Science is enabling us to begin to perceive, in some degree, the spiritual perfection of man as the son, or expression of God, and so today to heal the sick.

This coming Sunday has been set by the teachers as rally and promotion day in the First Presbyterian Sunday school. One meaning is 'to restore to original purity or integrity; to make whole.' Christian Science does this as no other system does, for it brings to the understanding that primal God-ordered integrity and wholeness of character which makes health the normal and continuing condition of man."

John Sarginson, National Forest service agent in the Lake o' the Woods area, said today that the road from Klamath Falls to Lake o' the Woods and beyond to Butte Falls and Ashland is open to traffic.
 The west side highway to Rocky Point and Fort Klamath is also open, he said.
 Sarginson reported, however, that forests in that area are still closed and warned prospective deer hunters that hunting is not permitted from a road.
 He said the only area open at Lake o' the Woods is that including summer homes between the road around the lake and the water and that no hunting is permitted in that area.
 All of the roads had previously been reported closed.
