Date Undetermined

The date upon which the order will become effective, probably not before Nov. 1, was left undetermined and Price Leon Henderson will decide whether the basic 4-gallon weekly ration will prevail throughout the United States, as it does in 17 eastern seaboard states.

The four gallon value per coupon has always been subject to change.

The price administration's coupon plan in the east provides a basic ration of 2880 miles a year at 15 miles to the gallon. Supplemental rations permitting up to 470 miles a month for occupational purposes are issued also.

NAZI ASSAULT ON VOLGA CITY STOPPED COLD

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street, Red Star said any local gains scored by the invaders were made by "crawling across mountains of bodies and burned tanks."

German warplanes were reported switching their attacks to Volga river crossings, evidently fearing to drop their bombs on the confused battle scene lest they annihilate their own troops. Nevertheless, the Russians said food and munitions continued to flow to the defenders from supply stores on the east bank of the river.

Nazi Reserves Pour In

Once again the German radio boasted hopefully that "there can be no doubt left with the enemy regarding the result of this battle," and Berlin movie audiences were shown films from the Volga front depicting German troops penetrating into Stalingrad's once beautiful but now rubble-littered boulevards. It was just two weeks ago that Nazi troops first entered the city's suburbs and that the Germans declared the battle had reached its "final phase."

Soviet headquarters said Hitler was pouring masses of reserves into the critical northwest zone and launching repeated counterattacks in an attempt to stem the Russian offensive which has gouged deep into the Nazi left flank.

CIO Opposed to Labor Draft, Murray Asserts

ATLANTA, Sept. 26 (AP)—CIO President Philip Murray said today that the Congress of Industrial Organizations "would be unalterably opposed to the complete regimentation of workers for the very good reason that we don't believe it is necessary."

Discussing suggestions for the drafting of labor to meet wartime shortages in some localities and industries, Murray said in a press conference that the CIO approves a resolution offered by Senator Pepper (D-Fla.) "providing for a complete over-all investigation of the problem."

"Before the government assumes the hazard of universal regimentation it should first go into the question of whether it is needed, where and how."

Land-Based Bombers Held Ineffective

BOSTON, Sept. 26 (AP)—Naval air heroes of the Pacific war, gathered here for the launching of the new aircraft carrier Lexington today, reported yesterday heavy land-based bombers had proved completely incapable of halting an invasion fleet and that only dive bombers and torpedo planes, principally carrier-based, could do the job.

Lieut. Commander John S. "Jimmy" Thach, after receiving two decorations for his performance on the now-destroyed carriers Lexington and Yorktown, hit at what he called "a popular belief that this country can win the war simply by building and sending out huge quantities of heavy bombers."
