Girl Scouts Plan Program To Help Children of World

Immediately after Pearl Harbor, the Girl Scouts of the United States put their services at the disposal of the U. S. government to help in winning the war and winning the peace as well.

In accepting their services, the secretary of the treasury has given them the title of "Minute Maids" and with the consent and cooperation of the government the plan outlined below has been worked out.

Between October 1 and Thanksgiving day, November 26 this year, the Girl Scout national organization is asking each one of its members, girls and adults, to purchase at least one extra war stamp from her own earnings and to send this to national headquarters as her contribution to a Girl Scout victory fund. This fund will be used "for the alleviation of distress among the children of the world as soon as conditions permit." The total of the Girl Scout victory fund will be announced to the nation on December 7, 1942, first anniversary of Pearl Harbor.

Here in Klamath county the stamps will be sent to Mrs. L. N. Huls, at the Audley apartments, who will have charge of the collecting and forwarding of the stamps. There may be some girls who are registered scouts, but who are not at present connected with any troop. These, too, are urged to share in the work, by earning and sending in their stamps.

IRRIGATION WATER SHUTS OFF SEPT. 30

September 30 has been set as the time when irrigation water serving the Klamath basin will be shut off for the season, according to an announcement by B. E. Hayden, Klamath project superintendent of the U. S. reclamation service.

Every effort will be made as soon as the canals dry up, he said, to put them in good shape for use next spring, although a shortage of labor is expected to be a handicap. He stated that the canals themselves are in good condition this year, but the formation of hairy and leaf moss has been worse than usual.

To prevent the moss from clogging structures, it has been necessary to use a heavy drag chain to clean out the canals and this work will be continued, Hayden said. In the Tulelake section, the lack of help has been so marked that the farmers themselves have had to provide the labor necessary, using USRS equipment.

Heavy Diversion

Storage in all reservoirs upon which the Klamath basin depends is said to be excellent, with an estimated two year supply on hand at Clear lake after the release of 28,000 acre feet this season, and a one year supply in Gerber reservoir from which 28,400 acre feet have been diverted for irrigation. Clear lake was reported to be at the highest elevation at this time of year since 1924.

Diversion through the A canal from Upper Klamath lake this season has been the heaviest since 1939, with 200,000 acre feet released. Although the level of the lake is 3 feet below what it was at this time last year, there is always ample storage there to supply all demands upon it.

Labor Secretary Certifies Disputes To War Labor Board

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26 (AP)—Secretary of Labor Perkins certified to the war labor board Thursday a dispute involving the Anaconda Copper Mining company, CIO's mine, mill and smelter workers, and about 12,000 employees in Montana. Among the issues are wages and retention of five days pay upon the resignation or discharge of an employee.

Other disputes certified to the board included: Pine industrial relations committee, Klamath Falls, Oregon, and the California provisional committee, International Woodworkers of America (CIO); issues uniform wage increases, vacations with pay, deferment of lumber workers from military service; about 6000 workers.

The PIRC dispute is one arising out of recent CIO demands for a pay increase to 95 cents per hour which the PIRC turned down in a meeting here three weeks ago.

Union officials said at the time that the case would be put before the WLB.
