DEMOS RAPED FOR 'PUBLICITY PLAY'

SALEM, Sept. 28 (P)—The effort of the state democratic organization to force Secretary of State Earl Snell to include President Roosevelt's picture in Oregon's election pamphlet is just a "cheap political by-play and an attempt to get some cheap publicity," Governor Charles A. Sprague charged today.

W. L. Josslin, secretary of the democratic state central committee, and other democratic leaders filed suit in Marion county circuit court to force Snell to include the picture. Snell had refused, citing a state law providing that the only pictures to be published are those of candidates. The case will be argued Wednesday.

"The publicity that the democrats get will react against them," the governor said. "I think the finest example of political unity in war-time is the nomination by the Clatsop county democratic central committee of Merle Chessman, Astoria publisher and a republican, for state senator."

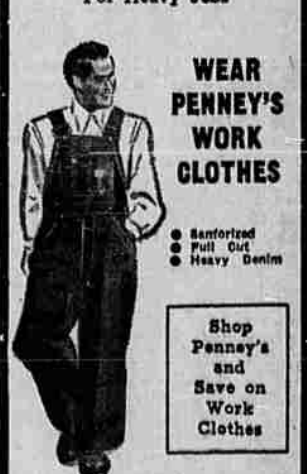
