

# COUNCIL EYES RULING AIMED AT WITNESSES

Another ordinance aimed at Jehovah's Witnesses was read to the council Monday night, but first action on it was delayed for a week by common consent of the councilmen.

This ordinance would prohibit any person from entering upon residential property to leave any handbill or pamphlet, or to play a phonograph record, without being invited thereon by the property owner.

Members of Jehovah's Witnesses reportedly sold pamphlets from door to door and played phonograph records on porches prior to the recent disturbance over their activities.

Councilman Rollin Cantrall said he favored holding up this proposed ordinance, as well as another aimed at pamphlet vending on the streets, until the supreme court reconsiders a decision affecting Jehovah's Witnesses.

It was decided not to act upon the ordinance Monday night, but delay it a week. At next week's meeting, an ordinance imposing a license fee of \$5 on pamphlet vendors will be read for the third time. This also is aimed at the Jehovahites, and replaces a similar ordinance imposing a \$10 fee.

**Airport Lease**  
The council referred to the traffic committee an ordinance which would require vehicular stops at all railroad grade crossings on city streets. The State Railroad association asked that action be taken to require stops at main line crossings.

Councilman Bussman objected to requiring stops on South Sixth street at several spur tracks, as provided in the proposed local ordinance.

The council adopted an agreement between the city and the Standard Oil company, making the Standard's lease of certain airport facilities inferior to that of a contemplated lease of the airport by the federal government. Standard has a month-to-month lease at the field, where it has gas tanks and pumping equipment. Under terms of agreement, Standard's lease would be suspended for the life of the government lease, although Standard would continue to serve private aircraft.

**Traffic Violations**  
In this connection, a letter was read from the army engineers at Portland, disclosing that the secretary of war and the civil aeronautics authority are working out a new lease for municipal airports such as that at Klamath Falls. Some time ago the army proposed a lease of the field, but never executed it. The new proposal, when completed, will be offered instead of the old one that never was concluded.

Councilman Bussman asserted that motorists are violating the "no left turn" signs on Main street, and that pedestrians are ignoring the wait and walk signals. Mayor Houston said the police department would undertake more rigid enforcement.

**Tank Found**  
It was brought out in the discussion that the "no left turn" signs are not easily read at night. City Engineer Thomas reported that he had dug an old 750-gallon tank from the ground near the city hall. It was turned over to the park board, which needs a tank for fuel oil at Moore park.

The council received a letter from the Fraternal Order of Eagles praising the work done by Police Chief Earl Heuvel and Captain Lynn Roycroft of the police reserves at the time of the disturbance over Jehovah's Witnesses.

The council also received a letter from Arthur L. Anderson, 3445 Anderson avenue, praising the police department and Chief Heuvel for "tactful firmness" in handling the riot. He said the department action had prevented bloodshed on one side or the other.
