

CONSTRUCTION FINISHED ON ALTURAS ROAD

The reconstruction program on the Klamath Falls-Reno highway south of Tulelake has now been completed and the road is in excellent condition. It was reported at Wednesday noon's meeting of chamber of commerce directors.

President Mitchell Tillotson said that news of the improvement of the road should be widely disseminated, because it was in a poor condition for a long time and many people do not know of the big reconstruction program carried on there.

The chamber highway committee will send letters of appreciation and congratulations to the bureau of public roads, California highway department, and the forest service.

Ed Davis of Tulelake was present at the chamber meeting. He said that ordinarily, a celebration would be in order, but because of the tire and gasoline situation, nothing of the kind was contemplated.

H. C. Groesbeck, member of the chamber, discussed the gas and tire rationing program as it relates to western conditions. He said that in the east, inter-urban railroads and bus lines make it feasible to reduce private transportation far more drastically than in the west, where settlements are scattered and public transportation has not been developed to such an extent.

The chamber transportation committee was asked by the directors to do everything possible to bring to Klamath Falls a branch of the Office of Defense Transportation, for the convenience of truckers in Klamath, Lake, Harney, Modoc and Siskiyou counties. A district office is being located at Medford and a branch office is sought for Klamath Falls.

Year 'Round Plan Is Basis Of Food for Victory Program

Food for Victory program starts at home with a plan to make the farm feed the family. With year 'round plans the family starts to work growing vegetables, gathering fruit, raising cows for milk, animals for meat, chickens for meat and eggs—producing food that can be stored or preserved for use in the non-productive seasons.

Production of year 'round food supply will reduce cash expenditures for food and will help to conserve commercial food stores. We should check our present supplies against recommended allowances for an adequate diet.

The U. S. Bureau of Home Economics suggests the following amounts for each person in the family to be preserved or stored for non-productive months: meat—140 pounds of all kinds of meat, including beef, pork, poultry, fish and game to be frozen, cured or canned.

Vegetables—30 quarts of tomatoes canned; 56 pints canned, frozen or brined of leafy green or yellow vegetables; 40 pounds stored of vegetables such as cabbage, carrots and squash; 112 pounds stored of vegetables such as beets, cauliflower, onions, parsnips, rutabagas and turnips; 10 pounds stored of dried beans, peas or nuts; potatoes 160 pounds stored.

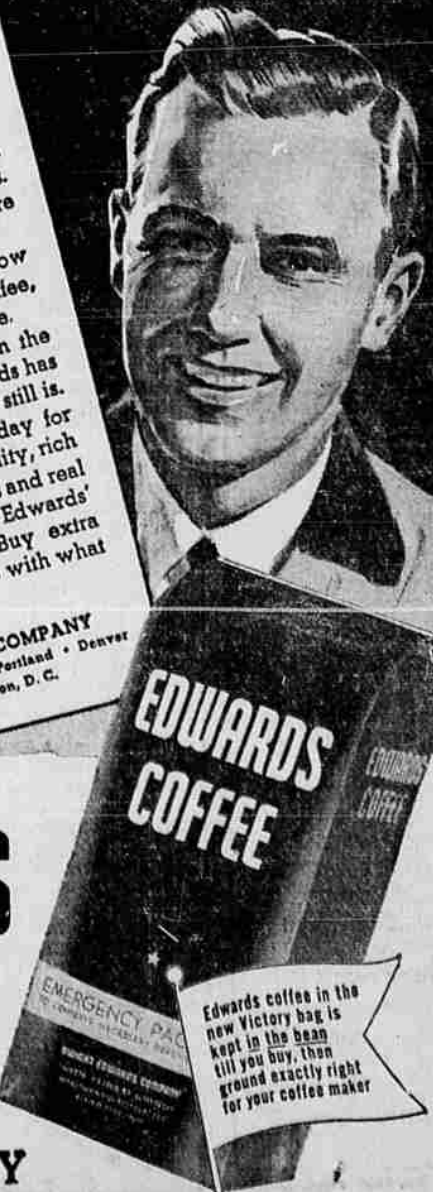

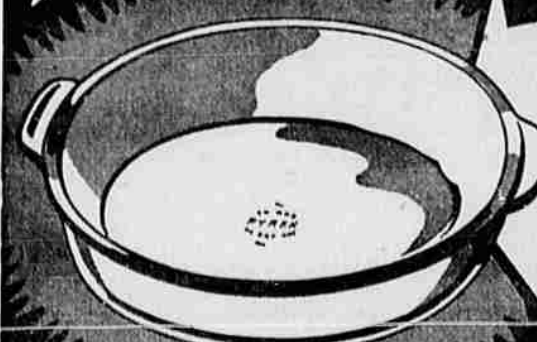
