SEATTLE, Oct. 1 (AP)—Behind locked gates for the second successive day, the Washington football squad faced an intensive drill today in defense against Southern California formations. Coach Ralph (Pete) Welch emphasized the need for defensive improvement after the freshmen, who turned out for the first time this week, staged a strong downfield march with U.S.C. plays. Washington plays U.S.C. here Saturday in the first conference test for both teams.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 1 (AP)—Southern California's football Trojans are off on an extended cross-country jaunt which will throw them against the University of Washington at Seattle Saturday and Ohio State at Columbus October 10.

The Trojans, drubbed by Tulane in their only start this year, were given a sendoff reminiscent of those in the days when they were one of the most feared teams in football. Several hundred fans were at Union station when the squad of 33 boarded a Southern Pacific train, and the USC band blew mightily.

MORAGA, Calif., Oct. 1 (AP)—Coach Tex Oliver of the St. Mary's pre-flight navy training school today named Vic Bottari, California, to start at left halfback in place of Jimmy Newquist, against UCLA Saturday. Bottari has recovered from an eye operation.

The team will leave tonight and work out in the Rose Bowl at Pasadena tomorrow.

Lon Stiner Worries Over Jurkovich Threat; Warren Loses Oxman for WSC Tilt

Allison Selects 28 Men for Beaver Tiff

CORVALLIS, Ore., Oct. 1 (AP)—Coach Lon Stiner and his Oregon State college football squad had good reason today to worry about the role Jim Jurkovich, star California halfback, would play in Saturday's game here.

Bob Kennedy, 150-pound second-string sophomore halfback took Jurkovich's part in California plays yesterday and ran wild through the Beaver first string. In fact, he did so well that Stiner indicated he might see plenty of action against the Bears.

BERKELEY, Calif., Oct. 1 (AP)—Coach Stuber Allison today selected 28 men who will leave tonight for Corvallis, Ore., to meet Oregon State's football team Saturday.

The coach, who said he saw some improvement in the team after scrimmage yesterday, added his starting lineup probably would look like this:

Harry Agler, right end; John Ferguson, left end; Charles DeCoudres, right tackle; Gene Frassetto, left tackle; Harry Pieper, center; Jim Jurkovich, left halfback; Johnny Graves, right halfback; Walt Rawn, quarterback; and Frank Porto, fullback.

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 1 (AP)—With only a few hours remaining before enroute for Pullman for Saturday's football game with Washington State college, the University of Oregon had backfield trouble today.

Coach John Warren had counted heavily on the return of Tom Oxman, regular fullback, for the Cougar tilt, the first conference game for both teams. But it appeared as if the knee injury which kept him out of last week's game with the St. Mary's Navy Pre-Flighters still would keep him on the bench.

Warren also complained that the passing and punting was far from what he expected from his backs.

PORTLAND, Oct. 1 (AP)—He belted out 205 hits for a .331 average in his first season in the major leagues, but that did not cause Johnny Pesky of Portland to lose respect for big league pitching.

"Yes, sir, all the pitchers . . . are tough," said Pesky, star of the Boston Red Sox and one of the great first-year players of the majors, on his return home yesterday.

Pesky praised the Red Sox' other willow star, Ted Williams. "He has a quick temper, but he'd give you the shirt off his back. When I first joined the club Ted took me around, told me all about the pitchers I'd face and how to hit them—mighty swell way for a star to treat a rookie."

Pesky expects to enter the navy shortly. He has already taken the oath.

Western Oregon high school football teams go into action this week-end, but the top games again will be in the southern and eastern parts of the state.

In the Blue Mountain League Milton-Freewater's Pioneers, who played a scoreless tie with Pendleton last week, will journey to La Grande to meet the league leaders. Pendleton will play at Baker, loser to La Grande by one touchdown.

The Southern Oregon Conference also gets under way with Grants Pass meeting a chastened Medford team. The Medfords, rated as one of the state's powers, dropped a 14-0 decision to Marshfield last week, while Grants Pass was tying North Bend, 6-6.

Other southern Oregon games will send the strong Klamath Falls Pelicans to Eureka, Calif., and Ashland to Lakeview.

In western Oregon, Salem will meet Oregon City and Albany will play Silverton, but most of the other big teams will not get rolling until next week.

Games include: University of Eugene at Sweet Home, Lebanon at Cottage Grove, Forest Grove at Seaside, Waldport at Newport, Toledo at Siletz, Reedsport at Roseburg, and the Tualatin-Yamhill Valley league jamboree.

In the mid-Columbia region The Dalles will invade Camas, Wash. In central Oregon Redmond will meet Burns and Condon will play Arlington.

World Series Sidelights

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 1 (AP)—The never-say-die St. Louis baseball fans will be recalling the second game of the 1928 World Series as they file into Sportsman's park today.

That was the year Herb Pennock pitched the Yankees to a 3 to 2 win in the first game with the Cardinals. The next day, with the aging Grover Cleveland Alexander hurling, and Rightfielder Billy Southworth, the present Card manager, smashing out a timely home-run, St. Louis evened the count and then went on to win the Series.

A victory in today's game is a must in the books of the record-minded Card fans. These followers point to the Series History Book which shows that no team ever lost the first two games of a 7-game series and then came back to win the world's championship. The Giants dropped a pair to the Yanks at the start of the 1921 Series and finally won, but that was in the days of 9-game engagements.

Today's best parley: The name of the winning pitcher will begin with the letter "B" and the victory will be his 22nd of the year. Rookie John Beazley of the Cards and the Yanks' Ernie Bonham are scheduled to do the mound chores, and both have been credited with 21 wins.
