

Witnesses to Resume Pamphleteering, Report

Klamath public authorities have been notified by letter by a representative of Jehovah's Witnesses that the Witnesses contemplate early resumption of their pamphleteering and phonograph playing activities, it was learned Thursday.

The letter states in effect that the Witnesses consider the practice of their religion the spreading of the "word of God" by pamphlet selling, door-to-door canvassing, phonograph playing, or any other method which "God may open" to them.

They informed the authorities that they expect protection under their constitutional rights and will hold the authorities liable for any damages to person or property. The letter, addressed to both city and county officials, was signed by the Klamath Falls "company" of Jehovah's Witnesses, by H. G. Brander, "company servant."

Cessation of Witness activity has been noted here since a convention of the sect which culminated in a patriotic demonstration against them here September 20. The demonstration for a time assumed riot proportions, with some damage done to automobiles and the convention hall at Ninth and Klamath, and some minor injuries to both Witnesses and irate townspeople.

Two city ordinances aimed at curbing Witness activities are "in the mill." They would prohibit street vending of pamphlets, except by license, and would prohibit persons from going on property to play phonograph records or leave pamphlets without being invited thereon by the property holder.

An ordinance passed some time ago to prohibit vending without a license is being revised to lower the license fee from \$10 to \$5. Meanwhile, the council has instructed the police not to make arrests under the old ordinance.

Numerous letters have been received by authorities here concerning the Witness situation.

The chamber of commerce received a letter this week from Mrs. Paul Dobson of Exeter, Calif., saying, "Three cheers for you folks at Klamath Falls who showed those Jehovah Witnesses in what contempt most right-thinking Americans hold them. Here in this district we are so fed up with them using their tires and gas to go around annoying hard working people by trying to play records to them—and all of them 'ministers' so they are exempt from military service."

She went on to say that it is hard to think of people who refuse to salute our flag as Americans and entitled to the protection of our laws. The letter concluded with the wish that "we could do something constructive about this shameful group."

land and watch his great yards building ships. You'll come away impressed.

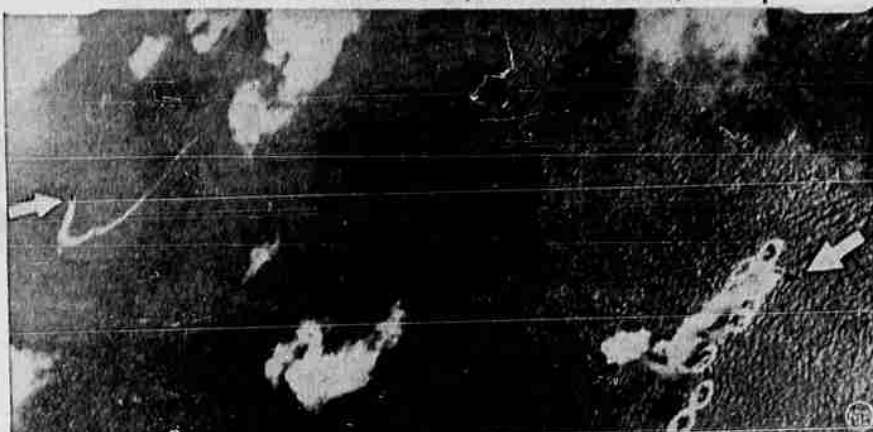

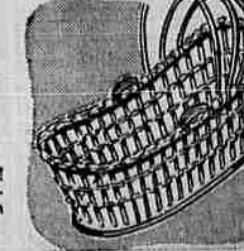
