NEW TULELAKE BANK BUILDING OPENS MONDAY

TULELAKE, Monday, October 6, the personnel of the Tulelake branch, Bank of America, will greet customers in the attractive new bank home completed this week on Main street. The spacious hollow tile and stucco building, under construction since last May, is a far cry from Tulelake's first bank opened here September 1, 1936, in the quarters now occupied by the bank.

Furnishings were meager but customers were grateful for the opportunity to do business in their home town instead of traveling to Dorris or to Merrill, in Oregon. Many Tulelake residents banked as far away as Klamath Falls.

Construction Delayed
Alex Clements, the first cashier, was still in charge when a remodeling program was completed and the facilities for serving the public were increased.

Last spring the building occupied by the Yukno cafe was moved and the foundation for the new bank building was completed. Construction, due to technicalities, was delayed for a time but during the last few months has been rushed to completion.

The new structure affords 2400 square feet of floor space as compared to 960 feet in the old quarters. There will be seven tellers on the staff as contrasted with three formerly. A complete, modern vault has been provided with safety deposit facilities.

Reflects Growth
Public lobby space has been more than doubled and the staff will have greatly increased working room. Architecturally, the new quarters have been finished in a modern manner and will be a distinct asset to the community. Woodwork in the interior is dark against pale green walls; double doors and corner plate glass windows complement the white tile frontal exterior. The frontal foundation is black tile.

"Reflecting the healthy growth of the Tulelake area, the business of our bank here has been showing a steady increase for some time past," Manager R. M. Prior commented Thursday. "Our fine new and larger quarters will put us in a position to serve this growth adequately. Tulelake's agricultural production is of first line importance to our country's war effort and we in the bank are glad to be in an improved position to serve this industry and all other local business, industrial and individual financial needs."

Visitors Welcome
Prior further stated that under normal conditions the move would call for a grand opening and reception, but with the entire nation now devoted to the war effort, it has been decided to "get right to work" without ceremony.

"However," said the banker, "we will be very happy to receive visits from our customers and friends and show them through the new quarters on Monday."

Members of the increased staff are Prior, who has been in charge since December 26, 1938; Glenn Renfro, assistant cashier; Charles Flannigan, Marjorie Eagle and Evelyn Nelson. Charles Hackett, former employee of the bank who left his work to take a course in officer's training, will return October 10 to resume his work.

War Affects Housekeeping, From Salads to Traveling

Editor's Note: War touches every home and every citizen. This column, based on official government information and prepared by the Office of War Information, shows how the war will affect Mrs. America and her home.

The war will dip right into your salad bowl by means of a WPB order reducing slightly the amount of fats and oils which can be used in the manufacture of salad dressing, mayonnaise and similar products. The order, intended to build up a reserve supply of fats and oils, also limits the types available for use in paints, varnish, lacquer, linoleum and oil cloth. There is no restriction on the use of fats and oils in finished food products where oil is not the principal ingredient as for example, in bakery goods. Neither are butter, cocoa butter, mineral oil or vitamin bearing oils affected.

The fact that a wife works does not necessarily hasten her husband's induction into the Selective Service, according to the Selective Service and the War Manpower Commission. And so married women should be able to take their position in industry and war production without affecting their husband's liability for draft. Actually, the induction of husbands may be deferred by married women in industry, since their employment can release workers, either unmarried or without dependents, for military service.

There will be lots of straggly locks in 1943 unless Mrs. America begins conserving the available supply of bobby pins and hairpins. A WPB order further reducing the manufacture of hairpins and bobby pins means that in 1943 there will be only 25 per cent of 1941 production. According to estimates, that means slightly less than one package of pins for every woman in the country in 1943. In 1941, 40,000,000 women bought 140,000,000 cards and packages of bobby pins and hairpins. So guard your present supply to make it go as far as possible.

Baby's canned foods are not to be restricted by the WPB order which controls distribution of many canned, fruits, vegetables, and fruit and vegetable juices.

However, adult members of your family won't feel the effects of this order too heavily. Although the Armed Forces and Lend-Lease requirements will take about a third of the total 1942-43 pack of canned fruits and vegetables, this year's increased production brings the total amount available for civilians to about the same as the average during the period of 1936-40. And don't forget you still have fresh fruits and vegetables to draw upon. Some of the canned vegetables affected by the order are asparagus, green and wax beans, carrots and peas, corn, tomatoes (whole or parts) and mixed vegetables.

Mrs. America's Junior probably won't be able to understand just why the WPB order placing castor oil under complete allocation control isn't more inclusive. There is no restriction on the consumption of castor oil for medicinal purposes.

You can begin to write "Merry Christmas" to navy men for Yuletide cards and parcels should be mailed between October 1 and November 1. Navy and postal officials advise you to mark packages as "Christmas parcel" to insure special handling. Location of the ship or naval unit of the addressee should not be indicated on the envelope. Only two post office addresses may be used: care of postmaster in either New York or San Francisco, depending upon which is nearer the addressee. Books will be accepted for this mailing at the rate of three cents per pound.

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And the reason will be due primarily to the increased cost of pineapple and maraschino cherries. The OPA will allow the canner to add the difference between his highest cost for pineapple and maraschino cherries during the first 60 days after beginning of the 1941 pack and the present maximum cost of these items.

No more than 15 pounds of copper may be used in a connection for an electric range, and likewise there are restrictions on it if it is a gas range installation.

And here are some more frills and furbelows to be trimmed. No more free samples of cosmetics. The WPB order regarding toiletries and cosmetics prohibits the distribution of samples because of the waste of materials.

Even the installation of a gas or electric range in wartime is not a simple task for the housewife. No utility has been permitted to make extension for the new consumer unless the house was wired or piped and ready for service prior to July 1, 1942, or in the case of a new house where the foundation was completed prior to that date. Now, however, if you move into a house not wired or piped prior to July 1, and if it is not equipped with a stove of any kind, you can get either gas or electric connection.

You can help alleviate the congestion of railroad and bus lines over the weekend if you and the family will shift your travel to the first part of the week. The Office of Defense Transportation

That Rusty Piece of Metal Is Better Than Virgin Iron--Turn It in Today!

NEW YORK, Oct. 2 (AP)—That rusting piece of metal around your house is better than virgin iron of the steel mills for manufacturing armaments and virtually all other steel products.

The reason—less on the old metal is lost in processing and the time of manufacture is shortened. The scrap contains less carbon, manganese, phosphorus, sulfur and silicon which must be processed out in making steel.

Iron and all its alloys, once they are processed into steel, retain their qualities practically forever. Only rust and abrasion destroy them, and whatever is left is always good.

That is why the scrap drive is on. That is why your old shovel is better fighting material than the mills can make, without spending some extra time. Two weeks after you turn in the shovel, it can be four hand grenades.

Absolutely no piece of scrap is too small; none too large. So long as it is metal, it is useful. Possibly you never knew that your shiny new autos of past years were, large, and sometimes wholly, made of steel that had been in use previously and then broken up for scrap.

More than half of America's great steel production has come from scrap for many years. Our steel today is about half scrap. And it will have to continue so. Scrap isn't merely a shortage. It is a new industrial problem. The only available mines are you and you, housewife, farmer and factory-owner. For each of you possesses, or is served by nine tons of steel. That is the per capita amount in use in the United States.
