DISTILLERIES' OUTPUT DIVERTED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2 (AP)—The war production board today ordered the entire output of the nation's distilleries diverted into industrial alcohol for wartime purposes after October 8.

Directives were issued to the beverage distilling industry to ship its entire output of "high wines"—raw whiskey of 120 to 140 proof—to commercial distilling plants for conversion into 190 proof industrial alcohol used in explosives and in Butadiene, the main ingredient of synthetic rubber.

WPB officials had estimated there now is something more than 3 1/2 years' supply of beverage whiskey in the country, despite already extensive conversion of the industry to industrial alcohol output.

No official WPB estimate was available on the amount of liquor remaining in the nation's stocks, but unofficial sources declining to be quoted by name offered the opinion that gin might run out by the fall of 1943; blended whiskey would last more than two years longer, and bourbon and rye — up to five years or more.

STEELS CLIMB, RAILS HIT NEW HIGH FOR YEAR

NEW YORK, Oct. 2 (AP)—Stock market strength shifted to the steels today although rails managed to edge into new high ground for the year or longer after absorbing heavy profit-taking on their recent upswing. Most leaders were at or near the best levels in the final hour. Transfers expanded to 904,390 shares, biggest volume since December 31 last.

Among stocks touching new tops for 1 to 5 years were Santa Fe, N. Y. Central, Southern Pacific, Southern Railway preferred, Atlantic Coast Line, Union Pacific, Panhandle Producing, Paramount Pictures, Twentieth Century-Fox, Goodyear, Goodrich, and U. S. Rubber.

Other prominent advances were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Republic Steel, Youngstown Sheet, Crucible Steel, Chrysler, J. I. Case, Douglas Aircraft, DuPont, Dow Chemical, Montgomery Ward and Air Reduction.

Slightly lower at times were American Telephone, American Water Works, Woolworth and American Can.

Bonds moved up selectively. Commodities were a trifle shaky.

WHEAT

CHICAGO, Oct. 2 (AP)—Wheat prices fell as much as a cent a bushel at one time today as a result of selling inspired by trade uncertainty as to the final wording of price control legislation being considered by a conference committee in congress.

The market rallied later, however, but displayed nervousness because traders were unwilling to take definite action until they knew what provisions the legislation would make for increasing government loan rates on basic crops. Meanwhile, with flour and milling trade quiet, there was little commercial activity in the market although some mill buying was reported on the rally.

Wheat closed 1/4c lower than yesterday, December \$1.28 1/4, May \$1.31 1/4; corn 1/4c down, December 85c, May 89c; oats 1/4c off to 1/4c up; soybeans 1 1/4c lower; rye 1/4c down.
