Mrs. Batte Pays Visit to St. Paul's Women at Gathering in Pelican Party Room.

More than forty women gathered in the Pelican party room Tuesday at one o'clock to greet Mrs. George McFarland Batte of Berkeley, California, provincial representative of the Episcopal church women's auxiliary, and other officers who paid an official visit to women of this section. Representatives from Summer Lake, Lakeview, Langell Valley, Prineville and Klamath Falls were noted.

The long table was beautifully appointed with bowls of pastel shaded asters, the speaker's table centered with a particularly lovely arrangement of the fall flowers. Other blossoms were used about the rooms.

In her message to women of the church, Mrs. Batte made the statement that "unity and understanding among all Christian women would surely come out of this war, and that church women throughout the world must stand united in this common effort to bring about a better world."
