

Soroptimists Hear Reeder

Large Group Klamath Members to Attend Installation at Lakeview Wednesday

Twenty-six Soroptimists gathered at luncheon Thursday at the Pelican party room to hear Judge U. E. Reeder explain the workings of the new Klamath tax coordinating committee, recently formed of the heads of the various tax levying bodies of the county for the purpose of preventing, as far as possible, duplication of tax levies.

Judge Reeder was introduced by Hostess Chairman Effie Garcelon, who said that although the subject of taxes was one from which we usually recoil, and, like Scarlett O'Hara, decide to think about it tomorrow, tomorrow and taxes both succeed in catching up with us and have to be faced.

Judge Reeder told the club that the county has nine tax levying bodies, each of which has its own problems to meet. He read the letter which had been sent out early in September calling these levying bodies together for the purpose of cooperating in their work and with the ultimate view of keeping taxes as low as possible in these days of necessary federal demands.

Among the committees appointed was one on the various health programs carried on by the county, the school districts and the city. This committee, it is felt, should be able to help the various units eliminate duplication of effort.

Another committee was appointed to investigate possibilities of cutting down expenses and eliminating unsanitary conditions where they may exist in the jails of the community. On this committee, A. H. Bussman and Bogue Dale will work with a representative yet to be appointed from the Klamath chapter of the League of Women Voters. Outstanding in this problem, the judge pointed out, is the situation created by the Indians taken into custody, and it is hoped that a remedy may be worked out through the cooperation of those in charge of Indian affairs. Another committee is investigating the possibility of consolidation of audits for the various subdivisions of the city, county, and schools. Juvenile delinquency and recreation are programs carried on by both city and county and if they can legally be united a savings might be effected, he said.

Judge Reeder gave a picture of the need by various irrigation districts and of the incorporated towns in the county for road equipment and drainage ditches, all of which the county has in sufficient quantities to be of great service. Men who work for the county could get in many more working days if it proves practical to allow the use of this equipment to the districts and the cities, instead of having indefinite lay-offs when "country work" is stopped.

President Coral Sabo announced that the report from the Cleveland biennial convention would be available to members next week. Rita Whisenant was appointed by the president to prepare a paper on Venture club objectives in response to a request from Mary Boyle of Portland, who will conduct a round-table on this subject at the Tacoma conference, October the tenth.

A delegation of about twenty-five members of the Klamath club are preparing to make the trip to Lakeview for the installation of the new club in that city, October the seventh. The regular luncheon of Thursday, October the eighth, will be omitted, attendance at Lakeview to be counted as local attendance.

Interesting Meet Of Toastmistress

Public's Responsibility in Time of War Topic of Group at Monday Night's Session.

"The Public's Responsibility in Time of War," a Readers Digest program outline, was directed by Mrs. Emmett Chidester, toastmistress of the evening at the Monday night meeting of Toastmistress club at Fremont school, with the president, Mrs. W. D. Miller, presiding. Mrs. Chidester kept the thought of our responsibility to our armed forces uppermost in the minds of the audience. "Will our boys be proud of us as we are of them," she said, "and are we doing all we can here at home to help them win this war?"

"Making War on Rumor" was the subject chosen by Mrs. John B. Cashin who said, "Our enemy's strategy is to divide and conquer. Under this plan irritations are set up between groups. If we can't get out there on the battlefields and fight for our country, we can avoid disruptive controversy, and we can refuse to act as a delivery boy for rumors."

Speaking on "Detroit's Fighting Milkman," Mrs. Dean Miller described the one-man fight against a monopoly of producers, distributors, drivers and politicians, who had successfully kept the price of milk up to fourteen cents a quart to the consumer. "When milk dropped to a price they could pay, white families tripled their purchases and colored families quadrupled theirs," she said, "and if the kind of resistance to new enterprise that exists in the milk industry continues, the free enterprise system in America will disintegrate beyond repair."

Mrs. W. D. Boyd described the importance of Britain and America to each other, for the future of the world, and the elements of friction between the two countries. She told of the guide book, issued by the

government, that our boys carry with them to England and how, if he studies it, our American soldier can begin his sojourn in England with a rich store of wisdom. "They can build a new trust between Britain and America," she said, "if both guest and host will allow for the unexpected ways of the other."

Surprise critic was Mrs. Keith Rice, and helpful and constructive criticism was given by the club's official critic, Mrs. W. H. Hibbard.

The timely topic was presented by Mrs. Carl Schubert whose subject was, "Compulsory Bond Buying." Mrs. Schubert encouraged the compulsory buying of bonds rather than paying the exorbitant taxes which we now face.

Proving the excellency of her listening ability Mrs. Emile Buzaid gave a comprehensive report on Mrs. Schubert's talk. Guest of the evening was Miss Hazel Morrison of 529 North Eleventh street. The next meeting of Toastmistress will be on October the twelfth at Fremont school.
