

PELICANS OVERWHELM EUREKA, 26-6

Klamaths Count Twice in Fourth

Slim Crowd Watches Oregonians Whip California Team in Afternoon Game

EUREKA, Calif., Oct. 5 (Special)—Klamath Falls' big Pelicans showed too much power on Eureka's veteran Loggers Saturday and hung the second defeat of the season on the Californians, 26-6, before a slim crowd here.

The Pelicans didn't get going until after a scoreless first quarter. In the second they scored on four plays from the Eureka 14 yard line, Coddington grabbing a six-yard pass for a touchdown.

After the kickoff and a Eureka punt, the Klamaths went right to work again and drove 50 yards for a second score in 10 running plays. Hank Schortgen, Dick Vaillancour made several nice gains and Don Mast shot over for the counter. Bernie Vaillancour missed the place kick for the second time.

Taking the third kickoff on their own 28, the Loggers marched down the field on pass and running plays for a touchdown. It was to be Eureka's only score of the game.

In the fourth, the Pelicans recovered a fumble on the Eureka

28 and scored on six running plays. An interception of Fullback Frankie Massaro's long pass on their own 43 paved the way for the fourth and final Pelican touchdown.

Four running plays moved the ball up to the Eureka 38 and from there Mast galloped all the way to pay dirt.

Near the end of the game, Massaro flipped a 43-yard heave to End Bob Bell but the Pelicans held from there and ended the Logger threat.

The invaders piled up 15 first downs to seven for Eureka. The Loggers attempted 18 passes and completed four for 87 yards. Frank Ramsey's team tried four and completed two good for 20 yards.

Beaver Win Over California Gives 'Em nod as Conference Favorite

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 5 (AP)—Coast conference football is still in the infancy stage of the 1942 season but from the way the schedule shapes up Washington State and Oregon State have better than an even chance to decide the championship when they meet at Portland, October 24.

They're the undefeated, double winning leaders of the circuit today and from the solid showings of the past two weeks figure to square away late this month in the slambang gridiron bout of the season.

To prepare the way for this crucial encounter, Washington State must hurdle Montana and Southern California in turn.

Southern California, on its own field in Los Angeles, no doubt will offer sterner opposition but the Trojans will have just returned from a two weeks road trip that sent them against Washington at Seattle and Ohio State at Columbus. They got off with a scoreless tie against a favored Washington eleven last Saturday.

Oregon State draws the University of California at Los Angeles in the south this weekend, then takes on Santa Clara at Portland.

Lon Stiners' Oregon State studious are defending the league title. Last week they had to do it the hard way, coming from behind with but seconds to play to defeat California's Bears, 13 to 8. Meanwhile Orin Hollingsbery's WSC Cougars turned in a sound performance in whipping University of Oregon, 7-0.

Santa Clara hit the arial lanes to snatch a 14-6 win from Stanford last week. The former was hardly in the power class on the ground and its one great end, Al Beals, who scored both touchdowns against Stanford, will have fletier men guarding him at California.

The Navy Preflight school team from St. Mary's defeated UCLA 18-7 last week and should roll over the U. S. Coast Guard squad, Saturday at San Francisco.

High School Gridder Dies of Game Hurt

Bogota, N. J., Oct. 5 (AP)—Co-Captain James Brady, 17-year-old Ridgefield park high school football player, died yesterday from an injury received in a game here Saturday. Tackled five yards from the goal-line as he raced for a touchdown, Brady left the game. He seemed merely shaken, but collapsed later from a ruptured spleen. His teammates meanwhile went on to a 3-7 victory over Bogota high.

Experts Puzzled by Collapse, Card Pep

NEW YORK, Oct. 5 (AP)—The mighty Yankees looked beaten and demoralized and out of pitchers as they went into the fifth game of the 1942 world series today against the St. Louis Cardinals, one of the most under-rated clubs ever to fight its way into the classic.

Defeated twice running in their home park by a team they had confidently expected to trounce, jittery and crippled and feuding with the umpires, the proud bombers looked ready for the kill. A vast majority of those who had witnessed the series to this point expected the world-running Cards to win again today and close out the championship, four games to one.

When they rallied twice in the closing innings to slug out a 9 to 6 victory in yesterday's tussle before a record series throng of 69,902 at Yankee stadium, the daring young men from the west left little doubt in anyone's mind that they had what it took.

The previous day they had done it with pitching, when their Lefty Ernie White blanked the old champions, 2 to 0—the first white-washing administered to a Yankee team in a world series since 1926. Yesterday the Cards said it with their bats, and for the second time in the series shook off a crushing home run by the Yankees' Charley Keller to break a resolute tie and come on to win.

Everyone was much impressed with the Cardinals. The locals had to be shown that a crowd of comparative youngsters could come in and practically run the Yankees right out of the stadium, and the lads from Missouri obliged them. In the subways and in the public houses, men were declaring solemnly that the Cardinals might be one of baseball's truly great teams.

The experts, themselves slightly groggy, were not disposed to argue very much about it. Practically all of them had thought the Yankees would win the series, but they had to admit they seldom had seen such baseball played as the Cardinals had poured into the Yanks since they suddenly found themselves in the ninth inning of the opening game at St. Louis and pounded Red Ruffing from the mound.

Yesterday, with 69,902 critical spectators looking on, Catcher Bill Dickey, one of the noblest Yankees of them all, made perhaps the first absolutely foolish and unnecessary wild throw of his illustrious baseball career to put the winning St. Louis run on third base, whence it scored a moment later. There was no accounting for it except that the Cards had upset even Dickey.

The Yankees just had tied the score in the sixth, wiping out a 6-1 St. Louis lead and the Cards had every reason to feel like slinging their gullets. The homer by Keller that had scored three runs and knocked Cooper from the box was enough to discourage probably any team except the present Cardinals.

Then to start the Card seventh, Atley Donald of the Yanks issued a pass to Enos Slaughter. Shaken, he also threw the fourth ball past Stan Musial. And what did Dickey do but loop a wild peg over second base in a totally meaningless effort to stop Slaughter short of second.

Slaughter had the base coming to him, of course, but he was so pleased with Dickey's effort that he raced on to third, and a moment later he scored as Walker Cooper slapped a short single to center field.

It was the game's winning run and Slaughter could not have scored from second on the hit—not with Joe DiMaggio throwing the way he does. Perhaps it was not important, as the Cards scored again in the ninth, anyway, on solid hits by Johnny Hopp and Max Lanier and a sacrifice, but it showed what the Cardinal running had done to the Yankees' nerves.

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Dodgers, Bears Only Undeatefated Teams

Brooklyn Hands Lions Third Straight Loss; Chicago Batters Cleveland, 21-7

CHICAGO, Oct. 5 (AP)—The Brooklyn Dodgers and the Chicago Bears were the only unbeaten clubs in the National Football league today.

Merlyn Condit darted for three touchdowns yesterday as the Dodgers handed the Detroit Lions their third consecutive loss and fourth for the season, by a 28 to 7 count. After the game the Lions' owner, Fred Mandel, dismissed Head Coach Bill Edwards and Line Coach Roy Miller, elevating Backfield Coach John Kargis to the helm.

The Cardinals, with victories over the Cleveland Rams and Lions, tasted their first defeat as the Green Bay Packers scored twice in the last quarter for a 17 to 13 win. Cecil Isbell tossed a touchdown pass to Don Hutson, his fourth scoring aerial in 14 straight league games. The Bears overcame the Cleveland Rams 21 to 7 as Rookie Charley O'Rourke and Sid Luckman each speared Ray McLean with long touchdown passes.

Inky Boe Starts in Pro Battle in Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 5 (AP)—All four teams in the northwest war industries professional football league had a win and a loss apiece as a result of an upset win by the Seattle shipbuilders over the Portland Boilermakers, 7-3, here yesterday.

Nation's Grid Giants Show Lack of Form

Upsets Mark Saturday Games; Minnesota, Texas, Notre Dame Defeated

NEW YORK, Oct. 5 (AP)—As subtle as a dollar alarm clock is the impression that this football season will be one without form.

This view isn't caused by the early defeats already pasted to the records of Minnesota, Texas, Notre Dame, Louisiana State, Fordham and other annual contenders for recognition. Rather, it's the variance in the play of a club from one week to the next.

Louisiana State pushed over Texas A & M on September's last Saturday but was a push-over for Rice in October's opener. Pittsburgh was a 50 to 7 victim of Minnesota one week but a 20 to 7 master of Southern Methodist the next. And the Gophers followed their lopsided win by losing to the Iowa pre-flight Cadets, 7 to 6.

The lack of consistency was predicted by numerous coaches as the distinguishing mark of the present campaign in a pre-season Associated Press poll. They attributed it to a lack of adequate reserves because of the war's manpower demands and the use of freshmen.

Upsets, however, generally add to a sport's attractiveness and the country's eleven are ready to provide another collection this coming weekend.

For the third straight week the Iowan Cadets of Lieut. Col. Bernie Bierman will tangle with Big Ten opposition. This time it will be Michigan, already the conqueror of the Great Lakes squad.

The Georgia Pre-Flighters oppose Duke, a surprise 20 to 7 loser to Wake Forest, and North Carolina's Clodbusters tangle with neighboring North Carolina State. The California Naval Aviators are idle.
