

CEMETERY SITE NEAR JUNCTION MAY BE CHOSEN

Tentative approval of a site for a municipal cemetery on the old Piedmont golf course, near Merrill-Lakeview junction, was disclosed by Councilman Rollin Cantrall, chairman of the cemetery committee, at Monday night's council meeting.

Cantrall said his committee had approved this site and was referring it to the real estate board for a study of the price. He said, however, that final selection had not been made and that the committee was open to suggestions of other locations for a cemetery.

The favored site is owned by the Klamath Western company, and consists of 70 acres of land above the Enterprise ditch. Cantrall stated. Water can be pumped from the ditch for landscaping the area.

A study of sites for a cemetery began recently after the council approved the cemetery committee's recommendation that a new cemetery be established, in view of the fact that space in the old Linkville cemetery in the city is limited.

City Attorney Carnahan gave

the council an opinion Monday night to the effect that it has a legal right to acquire a cemetery outside the city.

Stops by vehicles at three main line railroad grade crossings are required in an ordinance read for the first time at Monday night's council meeting. The crossings to be signed are at Alameda, Manzanita and Fremont streets and the Southern Pacific tracks.

At the suggestion of Councilman Bussman, the city will inquire as to the possibility of the railroad paying for signs to be erected, notifying motorists of the stop requirement.

The council laid on the table two ordinances affecting Jehovah's Witness activities here. Mayor Houston suggested this be done, pointing out that the United States supreme court may give a decision affecting such legislation.

Mayor Houston appointed E. M. Chilcote as chairman of the board of building appeals, and Melvin Cherry and Ralph Howard as members.

The council received a letter from H. M. Shapleigh, Great Northern superintendent, stating that railroads will try to keep locomotive whistling in Klamath Falls down to a minimum.

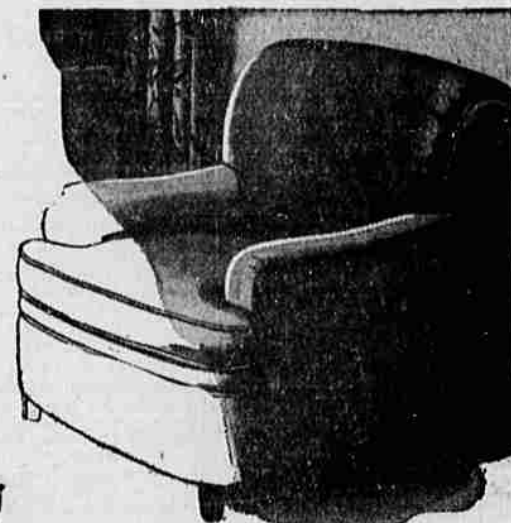

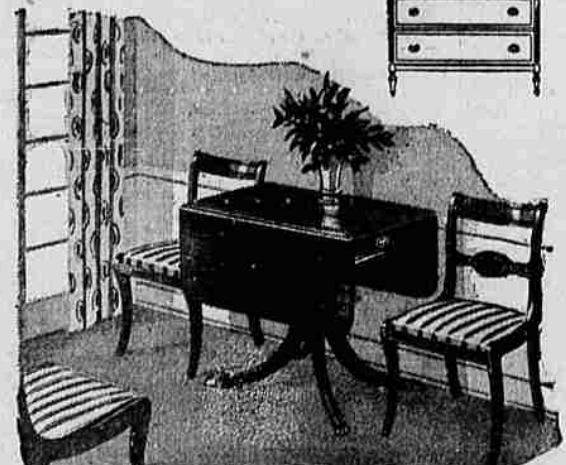
