

# PRICE LAUDS U. S. PRESS ON FDR'S JUNKET

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J., Oct. 6 (AP)—"It is an awful responsibility that lies on our press today," newspaper publishers were told last night by Byron Price, director of censorship, who praised them for keeping faith with the American people during trying war conditions.

"We may be thankful that the American press remains strong enough to serve valiantly and to good purpose, having suffered neither the crushing oppression of despotism on the one hand nor first-hand exposure to enemy bombs on the other," Price said in an address before the New Jersey Press association at the start of National Newspaper Week.

He said that "the public will applaud overwhelmingly what their newspapers did" in withholding the news of President Roosevelt's recent cross-country trip until after his return to Washington.

He urged individuals likewise to refrain from circulating information which might prove valuable to the enemy.

"No good American, wondering why certain news does not appear in the newspapers, will fill the gap by loose and self-important talk," Price said.

He said advertising of the president's tour "would have involved serious dangers," and added that the hazards of Prime Minister Churchill's recent trip to Russia and the Near East "were increased immeasurably because his route was eagerly reported day by day by the Berlin radio."

# NORTHWEST SOLONS OKAY PRICE BILL

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6 (AP)—All the northwest senators voted for final passage of the price control bill, which gave the president authority to adjust prices of farm commodities and provided prices could not be set below parity or the highest quoted since last January.

The bill was carried with 82 votes for it, none against.

Votes on the price control bill and various amendments were the only ballots taken in congress during the week.

The roll call on the final passage showed Bone (D-Wash.), Clark (D-Idaho), Holman (R-Ore.), McNary (R-Ore.), Murdock (D-Utah), Thomas (R-Idaho), Thomas (D-Utah) and Wallgren (D-Wash.) favoring the bill.

# WEST COAST CROWD RESTRICTIONS OUT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6 (AP)—Restrictions on the size of public gatherings on the west coast have, in effect, been eliminated.

Secretary of War Stimson, in a statement made public by Senator McNary (R-Ore.) said the limitations still apply, however, near aircraft plants, major naval and military establishments, and adjacent to highways which may be required for troop movements.

"Regulations specify that applications for the approval of crowds larger than 5000 be submitted 30 days in advance," Stimson said. "But this requirement has been waived so often as to be practically void."

"Except for the military considerations mentioned, the size and control of public gatherings is left almost entirely to civilian agencies."
